Application for political party establishment rights ongoing

ACCORDING to Section 3 of the Political Parties Registration Law, the Unity and Development Party, which wants to establish a political party in order to compete in the multiparty democratic general election, applied yesterday to the Union Election Commission for the right to establish a political party under the law and regulations.

To date, 16 parties have applied in accordance with Section 3 of the Political Parties Registration Law, and 50 parties have applied for the right to continue as politi-

cal parties and registration under Section 25 of the Political Parties Registration Law, bringing the total to 66 parties.

Union Election Commission continues to verify the right to establish and register these parties. — MNA/KZL

Thanlyin Bridge 3 construction on Bago River 97% complete

ACCORDING to the Department of Bridges of the Ministry of Construction, construction of the No 3 Thanlyin Bridge, linking Thakayta Township and Thanlyin Township in Yangon Region, has reached 97 per cent completion.

The bridge, described as a cable-stayed type with steel and PC boxes, is designed to accommodate vehicles weighing up to 75 tonnes, the report confirms.

Construction of the bridge began in May 2019 with assistance from Japan. It consists of four lanes and includes a 602-metre-long approach bridge on the Thakayta side and an 807-metre-long approach bridge on the Thanlyin side. The main bridge spans 1,224 metres, resulting in a total length of 2,633 metres (8,638 feet). The bridge provides a water clearance of 13.25 metres

Once completed, the new bridge will facilitate smoother transport of goods between Yangon, Thanlyin, and the Thilawa Special Economic Zone, alleviating traffic congestion on the existing bridge. — ASH/ TMT

Mountain ecosystem, forest conservation guarantee watershed area of Ayeyawady

THE world countries, including Myanmar, face natural disasters caused by climate change year by year. Meanwhile, Myanmar conserves the ice-capped mountain ecosystem and forest, aiming to preserve the watershed area of the Ayeyawady River, according to Khakaborazi Wildlife Sanctuary.

"The Khakaborazi Wildlife Sanctuary boasts icy mountains, 43 types of rare wild animals and mammals, and about 470 bird species. There are also 297 species of plants and 24 rare herbal plants. It is also home to Takin, Red panda, Moschus moschiferous and Bharal (blue sheep). It is because of the existence of icy mountains and forests. In summer, these mountains melt as a sign of climate change. The global warming causes climate change, and the people should notice that they are facing more natural disasters, " said Daw L Kay Si Yoon, Warden of Khakaborazi National Park.

Conservation of land ecosystems, forests and coastal ecosystems can guarantee fine weather. The Phonkanrazi Mountain shares a border with India, whereas the Khakaborazi National Park is with China. Therefore, Myanmar's icy mountain areas are located between two large countries, and they grab the opportunities to cooperate to develop the tourism industry, offer ice climbing trips, and promote environmental conservation.

"Myanmar has icy mountains, forests, and coastal regions, so if we conserve the icy mountain ecosystem and forest, we can preserve the whole watershed area of the Ayeyawady River and ensure its sustainability. If there are no ice mountains and forests, the water resources will dry up gradually. The govern-



ment alone cannot make efforts to promote the sustainability of conservation areas. All should work together. New generations will get the benefits of conservation. Therefore, if the mountain ecosystem and forest are sustainable and the coastal regions are green, in the northernmost part of Myanmar, the natural beauty of Myanmar can be seen obviously

and regain the fine weather," she added.

FISHERIES notices have been issued to prevent flooding of fish farming ponds and reduce losses as fish are raised in fish farms in various parts of the country for domestic consumption and export.

In order to prevent fish farming ponds from flooding due to excessive rain and river flooding and to reduce losses, it is advised to follow the following steps in aquaculture ponds. In order to strengthen the pond frames of the fish farming ponds, it is necessary to make sandbags in the low places where the pond frame is thin. If there is a flood, fence it with blue lace pipes to prevent the fish from escaping. In order to prevent water erosion in the fishponds close to the stream, it is advised to fence with sticks and bamboo walls and place sandbags.

Also, fishing nets, boats, and equipment should be prepared in advance to relocate the fish if necessary. It is also essential to keep the fish from escaping when feeding regularly and to carefully check the water outlets of the breeding tank and the places where the water will be crossed.

In order to be aware of special situations in real-time, farmers need to investigate ways to report and prepare in advance. It is recommended that people always listen carefully to news related to emergency weather warnings broadcast by national radio and broadcasting stations. It is also necessary for fish farmers to constantly read news and articles about the weather in local daily newspapers and exchange information with each other.

The Department of Fisheries has informed people to contact the nearest fisheries department and ask for help in case of emergencies due to flooding. — TWA/KZL

NCDC to grant permits for veterinary, slaughterhouse construction

THE Nay Pyi Taw City Development Committee will reportedly grant permits for construction work for the Department of Veterinary Medicine and Slaughterhouses to private entrepreneurs.

The construction work includes a steel structure for a holding pen in the meat production area, a tube well, a 5,000-gallon water collection pond, a pump house, and a 1,600-gallon water tower at the cattle markets in Tatkon township.

Interested businesspeople can obtain the tender forms from 27 May to 7 June and must submit them by 14 June at the latest. — TWA/TKO

Seintalone mango from southern Shan State bound for China market

A plan is underway to export Seintalone mango from Shan State (South) to China's market, according to Khwarnyo Fruit depot.

At present, Seintalone mango exports from Mandalay and Sagaing regions to China have almost ended. Therefore, Seintalone mango produced in Shan State is heading for China's market. They have market advantages over those from the Mandalay and Sagaing regions. A reasonable price is expected based on freight management and mango quality.

"Seintalone mango from southern Shan State is preparing for China's market at present. As they can be exported shortly, the

traders can ensure fresh fruit quality control. Freight management and packaging play a key role in placing the quality fruit on the market," a person in charge of the Khwanyo Fruit Depot said.

Nonetheless, China's abundant mango season will arrive on 20 June. Subsequently, the depot suggests traders observe market conditions first.

Fruit traders faced a series of challenges while exporting mangoes to China, such as watermelon export this year.

At present, exporters are facing trade hurdles such as physical damage to the fruits caused by transportation on rough roads, freight cost and market price.

The growers are battered by the high cost of cultivation input and export market risks every year. Low use of cultivation input brought down quality, causing postharvest diseases such as stem end rot and black spots in fruit in 2022.

As a result of this, some traders did not even cover the cultivation cost due to the inferior quality of Seintalone mango.

Of about 200 mango varieties that originated in Myanmar, Seintalone, Shwehintha, Padamyar Ngamauk, Yinkwe, and Machitsu varieties are primarily grown. The foreign market prefers Seintalone varieties.

Ayeyawady Region possesses the most extensive mango

plantation acres, having about 46,000 acres. Bago Region is the second largest producer, with 43,000 acres, and Mandalay has 29.000 acres of mango. There are

over 24,000 acres in Kayin State, over 20,400 acres in Shan State and over 20,000 acres in Sagaing Region, according to the association. - NN/EM

Forest Product Joint Venture to distribute dividends from 3 June

FOREST Product Joint Venture Corporation Public Company Limited will pay dividends starting from 3 June 2024. The company is to channel 30 per cent of earnings from the 2022-2023 financial year.

The stockholders need to present a shareholder certificate and citizenship scrutiny card to receive dividends. When individuals cannot receive dividends in person, they need to make an authorization letter to

collect the dividends on their behalf, along with a company letterhead, company registration copy, and company extract

The dividend payment for a company or an institution will be made by cheque. Shareholders can receive the dividend in cash. Those who have not claimed their dividends from the previous years need to contact headquarters to take them out. — TWA/EM

Frog farming resumption could boost market

THE number of frog farms has declined, though its market is likely to be thriving again if frog farms expand again.

In 2023, many frog farms were operated competitively, and the market was good, but the number of frog farms declined this year.

"The frog breeding market has declined a little. The business was pretty good in the same period last year. This market also depends on transportation routes. Frogs are mainly consumed in Lashio, Laukkai and Muse. We export to Mandalay this year. Domestic frog consumption is large. The majority of frog farms are located in Kayan Township as well as in Thanlyin Township. I don't want the number of breeders to decrease. If frog breeding expands this year, the market will be fine next year. The business was pretty good in last year," said a frog breeder in Kayan Township.

Including Kayan and Thongwa townships, frog breeding was operated commercially across Southern District of Yangon in order to provide frogs throughout the year. — Thit Taw/ZS

Foreign trade targeted to achieve US\$33B in FY2024-2025

 $aims \ to \ achieve \ a \ for eign \ trade$ target of US\$33 billion for the current financial year 2024-2025, comprising exports worth \$16.7 billion and imports valued at \$16.3 billion.

The departments and institutions concerned will exert concerted efforts to meet the trade target.

The value of Myanmar's foreign trade has reached over US\$3.5 billion as of 17 May in the current financial year 2024-2025, beginning 1 April, comprising imports valued at \$1.77 billion, the Ministry of Commerce's data showed.

The seaborne trade totalled \$2.85 billion, whereas the border trade value hit \$684.56 million. The total trade balance was \$3.116 billion in the year-ago period.

WHO chief addresses World Health Assembly, mentions Global Traditional Medicine Centre established in India

TX7 ORLD Health Organization (WHO) Director-Gen-**VV** eral Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus on Monday mentioned the Global Traditional Medicine Centre established in India, and the first global summit on traditional medicine, organized by the WHO and co-hosted by the Ministry of Ayush, in his address at the 77th World Health Assembly in Geneva.

While presenting his report to the 77th World Health Assembly in Geneva, Ghebreyesus said, "With WHO leadership, opportunities for technology transfer and geographically diversified manufacturing continue to expand. 15 partners joined the mRNA Technology Global Centre Transfer Programme, and with WHO support, have started expanding the technology pipeline to include

new vaccines of regional and global interest."

"We also established the Global Traditional Medicine Centre in India, and hosted the first global summit on traditional medicine," he added.

In 2022, the WHO and the Government of India signed an agreement to establish the WHO Global Centre

for Traditional Medicine. Supported by an investment of US\$250 million from the Indian government, this global knowledge centre for traditional medicine aims to harness the potential of traditional medicine from across the world through modern science and technology to improve the health of people and the planet, according to a WHO press release. In his address to the World Health Assembly, he noted that 2023 was a year of many challenges, but also of many achievements. He called 2023 a productive year in WHO's work supporting access to medicines and other health products.

New gasifier invented for drying traditional medicines

AFTER the rice husk-fired gasifier was created, a local industrial man, U Ko Oo, who is well-known for the invention of local-made gasifier, has created different kind of gasifier which can be used for drying traditional medicines.

It is different from his previous creation and can be fired with pieces of firewood, pieces of wood, and rice husk. As distinct from the previous one, it can be fired by a flammable substance yet to reach the stage of charcoal.

"Rice husk-fired gasifier invention has been widespread. But this kind of small-scale gasifier, which can be fired by greenwood, was invented for the first time. As distinct from previously invented gasifiers, it can be used by flammable substances such as pieces of firewood and rice husk that have yet to reach the charcoal stage. It can be fired by small pieces of firewood. Despite green wood, wet substances can't be used and must be dried firewood or small pieces of wood," said U Ko Oo.

It needs to use at least a viss of fuel to generate 10 kilowatts of electricity, and it will cost depending on engine capacity. He said he made it with a negotiable price based on the consumer's customized order. — MT/ZS

First artefact custody certificate issued for mammal, sal tree fossils display

IN a first of its kind, an artefact custody certificate has been issued to keep and display mammal and sal tree fossils in Popa's National Geopark, according to U Kyaw Myo Win, director of the Department of Archaeology and National Museum (Bagan Branch).

Dr Tun Hla Aung, owner of Linn Hotel in Byatta Street, Popa, Kyaukpadaung township, and his wife Daw Tin Tin Mar have established a museum to display 140 mammal and sal tree fossils found in the Ayeyawady rock strata for public study and to support the Mount Popa

Geopark, following an awareness campaign by the departments concerned. The hotel submitted an application to designate its museum as a geosite and to obtain the artefact custody certificate according to Form No 3 of the Rule of Ancient Artifacts Protection and Conservation".

The Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture issued the certificate in Form 4 after the necessary site inspection.

The ceremony to hand over the certificate to the owner of Linn Hotel was held at the Department of Archaeology and National Museum (Bagan Branch).

"This is the first time that the artefact custody certificate has been issued in the Geopark. For example, if you have more than 100 or 150 ancient artefacts, you have to apply for custody of them. When you have this certificate, it is legal to keep them. If you do not have the certificate, it is not legal. To keep any artefact that is 100 years old, you can apply to our Department of Archaeology and National Museum," U Kyaw Myo Win told the Global New Light of Myanmar. — MT/ZN



JLPT exam online applicants can access test vouchers from 1 June

FOR the Japanese Language Proficiency Test to be held in July 2024, test vouchers will be available as of 1 June for online applicants, the JLPT organizing committee, Myanmar Association of Japan Alumni said on 29 May.

If any original identification cards shown below, along with a colour-print test voucher, are not present, permission to sit the exam won't be granted, it said.

Types of eligible identification cards are ID cards (either 10-year-old ID or 18-year-old ID), passports whose validity is not expired, unexpired driving licences, birth certificates, and religious member ID cards (for novices, monks and nuns).

THE Myanmar Embassy in Malaysia stated that there have been scammers on Facebook and Tik-Tok for passport renewals, new applications, and Certificate of Identity (C of I) applications. It warned them that they would be punished.

In line with the instructions, the embassy provides complete service in one day to the people who have made appointments for passports and C of I at www. mekl.org.

Taking advantage of the ignorance of some Myanmar nationals, fraudsters on Facebook and TikTok have been spreading false news and disinformation texts/speeches, the embassy announced with the description

mar nationals on consular services, the list of approved new passport applicants and C of I matters are posted on the Facebookpage "Myanmar Embassy in Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia" and the website at https://myanmarembassykl.org.

As the Malaysian Government has intensified the Operasi to arrest undocumented migrants across Malaysia, Myanmar nationals are advised to be cautious when travelling these days and to carry their passports and necessary documents with them wherever they go to show them in case they encounter the operation, the embassy said.

Illegal goods seized in various states/regions nationwide

UNDER the supervision of the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, legal action is being pursued against illicit trading nationwide.

During inspections on 28 May, the Yangon Region Illegal Trade **Eradication Special Task Force** confiscated an unregistered Daihatsu Mira truck (valued at approximately K3 million) in North Okkalapa township. This enforcement was conducted under the Export and Import Law.

On the same day, enforcement teams intercepted illegal


timber weighing 16.645 tonnes (valued at K2.496 million) in Gwa township, Thandwe district. Additionally, four vehicles (worth approximately K130 million) were seized carrying 41 types of goods valued at K121.277 million, including 5,500 LED panel light bulbs without official documents, between Sinywagyi village and Kywalyegon village. Furthermore, a Nidi truck (estimated value of K25 million) transporting 1,232 gallons of illegal fuel oil valued at K15.116 million was apprehended at the Yadanabon Bridge (Mandalay)

checkpoint. The action was carried out in accordance with Customs procedures and the Petroleum and Petroleum Products Law.

On 29 May, combined teams intercepted an unregistered Honda Insight (valued at approximately K8 million) at the Kantalu combined checkpoint in Sagaing township. This action was taken under the Export and Import Law.

The Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee reported that 14 arrests were made on 28 and 29 May, with an estimated total value of K304 million. — MNA/MKKS

Nepal's budget focuses on hydropower, electricity export to Bangladesh

NEPAL has laid its focus on production of electricity and export to Bangladesh from the next fiscal year 2024-25, said Finance Minister Barsha Man Pun while unveiling the budget on Tuesday.

Addressing a joint session of the Parliament on Tuesday, Minister Pun said that, "the budget of NRs 1.96 trillion for the upcoming fiscal year announced to prioritize hydropower, especially, the reservoir-based hydroelectric projects. To achieve the target, a budget amounting NRs 50.74 billion has been allocated for the development of the energy sector."

Nepal intends to increase its hydropower generation capacity, taking advantage of its expanding power market access in Bangladesh. – ANI

Volkswagen plans cheaper battery model 'from Europe for Europe'

GERMAN auto giant Volkswagen on Tuesday announced plans for a cheaper-than-ever electric model, as it faces increasingly strong competition from Asian rivals that have taken a lead in battery technology.

The new model, which would be priced at around 20,000 euros (\$21,800) and be presented in 2027, would offer "entry-level electric mobility from Europe for Europe", VW CEO Oliver Blume said in a statement.

Volkswagen also detailed plans for a range of new battery-powered cars for under 25,000 euros to be unveiled as soon as the end of 2025.

These included two compact cars from its VW and Cupra brands, as well as two small SUVs, one each from VW and Skoda. All four vehicles would be produced in Spain, Volkswagen said. — AFP

US allows Cuban entrepreneurs conditional banking access

PRIVATE sector entrepreneurs in Cuba will be able to establish US bank accounts which they can remotely access, US officials said Tuesday, in announcing an update to the country's Cuba policy.

The new rules modify a longstanding embargo on Cuba, allowing conditional access to the US banking system among moves to support the private sector.

"These amendments will facilitate greater access to internet-based services for the Cuban people," a senior US official told reporters.

They will also "provide the independent Cuban private sector greater access to international transactions and US banking services, including through online payment platforms," the

official added on condition of anonymity.

Cuban Foreign Minister Bruno Rodriguez criticized the measures as "limited," saying "they do not reverse the cruel impact and economic suffocation" caused by the six-decade-old embargo imposed by Washington.

"These measures seek to create divisions within Cuban society," Rodriguez wrote on X.

Under the changes, independent private sector entrepreneurs will be able to set up remotely accessed US bank accounts for authorized transactions

According to US officials, this should help to facilitate the import of food, equipment and other goods that support Cuban people. — AFP

Utilizing coalbed methane, a byproduct of coal, helps mitigate mining risks, reduce greenhouse gas emissions, and alleviate gas shortages.

China's coal-rich province of Shanxi extracted 4.16 billion cubic metres of coalbed methane in the first four months of this year, a year-on-year increase of 13.7 per cent, according to the provincial energy administration.

The province's coalbed methane output hit a record high in that same period. The utilization of coalbed methane, a byproduct of coal, can help mitigate risks in mining, cut greenhouse gas emissions and ease gas shortages.

Shanxi has abundant coalbed methane resources. It has an estimated reserve of 8.31 trillion cubic metres of coalbed methane up to 2,000 metres below ground, accounting for nearly one-third of the country's total.— Xinhua

Samsung Electronics workers' union announces first strike

A major union representing tens of thousands of people at South Korean tech giant Samsung Electronics said Wednesday that workers will go on strike for the first time, potentially threatening key global semiconductor supply chains.

A spokesperson said union members, around 20 per cent of the company workforce, would use annual leave to strike for one day on 7 June, leaving the door open for a potential general strike down the road.

Samsung Electronics is one of the world's largest smartphone makers and also one of the only companies globally to produce high-end memory chips used for generative AI,

including top-of-the-line AI hardware from industry leaders such as Nvidia.

Management at the firm, the world's biggest producer of memory chips, has been locked in negotiations with the union over wages since January but the two sides have failed to narrow their differences.

"We are declaring a strike in the face of the company's neglect of labourers," the National Samsung Electronics Union said at a live-streamed news conference. — AFP

30 years after end of aparthied, S Africans vote in elections

The governing African National Congress (ANC) may lose its majority, according to opinion polls.

PEOPLE in South Africa began voting on Wednesday in an election that could mark a big political shift if the governing African National Congress (ANC) party loses its majority as opinion polls suggest, Al Jazeera reported.

Voters are electing nine provincial legislatures and a new national parliament, which will then choose the country's next president for the next five years. The election commission will announce the final results on Sunday.

The ANC led by 66-year-old South African President Cyril Ramaphosa will have to seek one or more coalition partners to rule the country if it gets less than 50 per cent of the national vote. The ANC has won six consecutive national elections since 1994.

This would then mark the

first time the ANC will be ruling in a coalition alliance government since it was catupulted into power at the end of with apartheid, 30 years ago with Nelson Mandela at its helm.

The country's largest opposition party is the centre-right Democratic Alliance (DA) led by John Steenhusien that was formed by merging the Democratic party and the New National party. — ANI

US planning to build lithium production plant in Ukraine: Ukrainian MP

THE United States wants to cooperate with Kyiv in the production of lithium and build a plant on the territory of Ukraine, David Arakhamia, leader of Volodymyr Zelensky's Servant of the People faction, said.

Such a decision was made due to the fact that China "controls most of the lithium" in the world, he added.

"The United States wants us to have something like a US-Ukraine consortium. We have large lithium resources. They want to build a plant to extract lithium in mines on the territory of Ukraine," Arakhamia said at the "Investing and Rebuilding Ukraine's Future" conference in Tallinn.

Arakhamia also noted that Ukraine has the largest and "cheapest" underground gas storage facility in Europe, and foreign investors could use it to store gas until its price increases. — SPUTNIK

Indian peacekeeper wins UN military gender advocate award

A UN peacekeeper from India is the recipient of the 2023 United Nations Military Gender Advocate of the Year Award, the world body announced on Tuesday.

Maj Radhika Sen, who served in the UN peacekeeping mission in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, known as MONUSCO, will be presented with the award on Thursday by UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres.

She was MONUSCO's engagement platoon commander for the Indian rapid deployment battalion from March 2023 to April 2024.

In a press release, Guterres congratulated Sen for her service, calling her "a true leader and role model" and her service "a true credit to the United Nations as a whole".

Created in 2016, the Military Gender Advocate of the Year Award recognizes the dedication and efforts of an individual military peacekeeper in promoting the principles of Security Council Resolution 1325, which addresses the impact of war on women and the importance of women's full and equal participation in conflict resolution, peacebuilding, peacekeeping, humanitarian response and in post-conflict reconstruction. — Xinhua

Dutch parties name top civil servant as new PM

DICK Schoof, a top Dutch civil servant, has been named as new prime minister of the Netherlands, the four political parties involved in forming a right-wing government announced on Tuesday. Schoof, 67, has held various positions as a civil servant and is currently a leading official at the Ministry of Justice and Security. He previously led the Dutch intelligence service, counter-terrorism agency, and immigration service.

Speaking briefly at a press conference, Schoof said that he is not affiliated with any party and has been asked by all four parties to accept the new post.

"I am there for all Dutch people," said Schoof. "I did not take the decision lightly and I stand here with full conviction."

The far-right populist Party for Freedom (PVV), the centerright New Social Contract (NSC) and People's Party for Freedom and Democracy (VVD) parties, and the farmers' movement BoerBurgerBeweging (BBB) have been in talks on forming a new Dutch government since the general election in November 2023.

PVV leader Geert Wilders, whose party gained 37 of the 150 seats in the House of Representatives, becoming the biggest party in the Netherlands for the first time in history, said that Schoof was chosen by all four parties. — Xinhua

Djokovic, Sabalenka advance at French Open with straight-set wins

NOVAK Djokovic began his French Open title defence with a solid win on Tuesday, overcoming some slumps during his opening-round match against French wildcard Pierre-Hugues Herbert to secure a 6-4, 6-7(7-3), 6-4 victory.

The Serbian star is aiming to become the first player in tennis history to claim 25 Grand Slam singles titles at Roland Garros, where he has lifted the trophy three times before.

"I don't want to get too excited," Djokovic said. "I thought it was a good performance for me. Solid. Of course, I could have done better, I think, on return games, but also credit to him for serving very well and changing things up".

Djokovic's 2024 results have fallen short of his usual high standards. For just the second season since he won his first ATP singles title in 2006, he arrived at Roland Garros without having reached a final at any level.

"I know what I'm capable of, and particularly in the Grand Slams I normally play my best tennis. I always aim to play my best tennis, and I have mostly been able to do that throughout my career, so that's the goal," Djokovic told the press before the tournament.

Thailand approves

longer visa stays to boost economy

HAILAND'S cabinet on Tuesday approved a string of visa facilitation measures, including extended stay periods for foreign tourists, remote workers and post-graduate students, in an effort to boost its vital tourism sector amid a sluggish economy.

Beginning in June, the Southeast Asian country will allow visitors from 93 countries and territories, up from 57 currently, to enter without visa requirements for stays of up to 60 days, while the list of those eligible for visa on arrivals will also increase to 31 from 19, said government spokesman Chai Wacharonke.

Starting in June, visitors from 93 countries and territories, up from the current 57, can enter without a visa for up to 60 days.

For digital nomads who seek to stay in Thailand for a long period and work remotely, their visa validity will be extended from 60 days to five years, with each stay up to 180 days, Chai told a news conference.

Foreign university students will be permitted to stay one year after graduation, while insurance requirements for long-stay foreign retirees will be relaxed, he added.

Thailand received over 14.32 million inbound tourists as of last week and is targeting at least 35 million foreign arrivals in 2024, with tourism receipts of 3.5 trillion baht (about 95.62 billion US dollars), according to the Ministry of Tourism and Sports. — Xinhua

Spain, Norway, Ireland formally recognize Palestinian statehood; Israel denounces move

AFTER making the announcement a week back, the European Union (EU) nations Spain, Norway and Ireland formally recognized the Palestinian state on Tuesday, The Hill reported.

This further shows intensifying pressure on Israel from Europe on its ongoing war with Hamas in Gaza.

Spanish President Pedro Sanchez called the move "a historic decision that has a single goal, and that is to help Israelis and Palestinians achieve peace".

The recognition, which is not expected to have an impact on the conflict, was quickly denounced by the Israeli government.

Irish Prime Minister Simon Harris said the recognition "sends a signal to the world that there are practical actions you can take as a country to help keep the hope and destination of a two-state solution alive at a time when others are trying to sadly bomb it into oblivion."

Nine members of the European Union, along with Norway, now formally recognize Palestine as a sovereign state, though previously Sweden was the only major power on the continent to do so.

Around 140 out of over 190 countries represented in the UN have already recognized a Palestinian state. EU members Malta and Slovenia have also affirmed that they may follow suit, though not immediately, as reported by The Hill. - ANI

World's first wooden satellite built by Japan researchers

THE world's first wooden satellite has been built by Japanese researchers who said their tiny cuboid craft will be blasted off on a SpaceX rocket in September.

Each side of the experimental satellite developed by scientists at Kyoto University and logging company Sumitomo Forestry measures just 10 centimetres (four inches).

The creators expect the wooden material will burn up completely when the device re-enters the atmosphere -- potentially providing a way to avoid the generation of metal particles when a retired satellite returns to Earth.

These metal particles could have a negative impact on the environment and telecommunications, the developers said as they announced the satellite's completion on Tuesday. "Satellites that are not made of metal

should become mainstream," Takao Doi, an astronaut and special professor at Kyoto University, told a press

conference.

The developers plan to hand the satellite, made from magnolia wood and named LignoSat, to space agency JAXA next week.

It will be sent into space on a SpaceX rocket from the Kennedy Space Centre in September, bound for the International Space Station (ISS), they said.

From there, the satellite will be released from the Japanese ISS experiment module to test its strength and durability. — AFP
