China launches media exchange programme for 100+ journalists from over 90 countries

THE China International Press Communication Centre in Beijing, the People’s Republic of China, launched a media exchange and training programme for foreign journalists on 22 August.

CIPCC was established in 2014 and will offer a four-month press exchange programme twice a year starting in 2024.

“The CIPCC programme will allow participants to study China’s development, learn about the media’s transformation process, and explore aspects of the country’s cultural heritage. Participants will also have the chance to interact with people from all walks of life in and outside Beijing, attend important

national events, and undertake short-term media internships with prominent media outlets,” said Mr Yu Lei, Director of CIPCC.

The programme has six communication centres — Africa, Asia-Pacific, Latin America-Caribbean, Europe-Asia, Arab, and European regions — and more than 100 journalists from over 90 countries are participating.

The programme includes visits to and information gathering in Beijing, prominent cities such as Shanghai and Tianjin, and areas inhabited by ethnic minorities.

They will also have the opportunity to study China’s media

development, culture, lifestyle, and technological applications in agriculture, as well as media and socio-cultural topics at Chinese universities.

In addition, they will have the opportunity to learn from China’s leading media outlets, such as CGTN, Xinhua, and People’s Daily, and to access information on important events during the training, including the Fifth Summit of the Shanghai Cooperation Organization, the 80th anniversary of the victory of the Chinese people’s war of resistance against Japanese aggression and the world anti-fascist war, and the China-Arab States Expo. — Khin Yadana/TH

ARMED terrorists have been launching attacks by using residential homes and administrative buildings in towns and villages as cover, where they have forcibly settled. That enables terrorists to use civilians as human shields. He urged outstanding students to continue striving to uplift the nation's image through education.

He noted that if a democratic nation is to be built, people must have higher levels of educational attainment in order to put election practices and democratic principles into practical implementation.

Despite difficulties, the Vice-Senior General recounted that the students have showed off their genuine quality and capability, resulting in a matriculation examination pass rate of 48.06 per cent, with as many as 196 students earning distinctions in all subjects.

As in the previous year, he pledged that arrangements are being made to send outstanding students who achieved the highest marks in their subjects on study tours abroad.

He continued that youth, while seeking better methods of advancement in line with the modern age, must also preserve and safeguard Myanmar's traditional culture and customs from fading away.

With the advancement of technology, he underlined that the use of social networks and media has become widespread, but within them, unethical fake news, misinformation, and fabricated reports can infiltrate with misleading thoughts and ideologies. Therefore, young people are urged to live with awareness, mindfulness, and wisdom.

The Vice-Senior General highlighted that if the new democratic nation that the people aspire to is to be realized, elections are of primary importance. Hence, elections will be held starting from 28 December this year, and following the elections, state responsibilities will be transferred to the elected government.

He urged all citizens including parents, youths, and ethnic people to understand the essence of the election and ensure that eligible voters exercise their voting rights without losing them.

He stressed that for the success of the election, which is crucial to building a

Restoration and preservation planned for Yangon Region High Court, an ancient building

UNION Chief Justice U Tha Htay, along with Union Minister for Construction U Myo Thant, Yangon Region Chief Minister U Soe Thein, Yangon Mayor U Bo Htay, and Director-General of the Department of Archaeology and National Museum Dr Kyaw Oo Lwin, inspected yesterday afternoon the restoration and preservation work planned for the ancient Yangon Region High Court building on Pansodan Street, Kyauktada Township, Yangon Region.

At the Yangon Region High Court building, officials explained the building's current condition, the restoration and maintenance plan, and plans for further work. The Chief Justice of the Union and the Union minister stated that, as a cultural heritage building, it must be systematically renovated and maintained to high standards without altering the original structure, while the responsible groups coordinate with the Department of Archaeology and National Museum and conduct

a detailed inspection inside the building.

The Yangon Region High Court Building, a three-story rectangular structure measuring 299.6 feet long and 288 feet

wide, was built between 1905 and 1911 at a cost of 2.45 million rupees and served as the seat of successive courts of the country's highest judicial body until 2011, making it a historic

building of great value.

Established under the 2008 Constitution of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar and the 2010 Union Judiciary Law, the Yangon Region High Court has

been operating in this building since 2011, carrying out its judicial duties.

The Yangon City Development Committee's Engineering Department (Buildings) designated the building as an ancient monument in 1996, and the Yangon Heritage Trust installed a blue plaque marking it as a Yangon city heritage building on 24 November 2017.

Regarding the building, Senior General Min Aung Hlaing, Chairman of the State Security and Peace Commission of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar, visited it on 4 August 2025 and stated that, as an ancient structure, the Yangon Region High Court building must be preserved without damaging its original form; in accordance with guidelines for maintenance to ensure its long-term strength, it will be renovated and maintained following heritage preservation standards, also enhancing its potential to attract foreign tourists. — MNA/TH

He also underlined the importance of continuous research and development to produce competitive goods.

The Union minister urged industries to work in partnership with local universities and colleges. He explained that the Ministry of Industry has been providing various training programmes, including courses in electricity, boiler operation and maintenance, household electrical installation, agricultural engine maintenance, welding, and short-

term technical courses, some of which are conducted on-site. He assured participants that additional courses would be arranged if needed.

Following his remarks, the Zone Management Committee chairman presented updates on ongoing activities and requirements within the zone. The Magway Region economic minister reported on relevant laws for systematic development. Bridging Borders: India-Myanmar Development Partnership Lifts Communities

INDIA'S developmental partnership with Myanmar is diverse, multi-sectoral and aimed towards the local benefit of diverse communities across the different states and regions of Myanmar. The underlying philosophy of the Indian approach towards international developmental assistance is rooted in the ancient Sanskrit phrase from the Maha Upnishad - Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam, or the world is one family.

Firstly, at the heart of India's developmental cooperation with the Global South, including Myanmar, lies a people-centric approach and a deep commitment to human resources development. Secondly, Myanmar lies at the confluence of India's three key foreign policy priorities - Neighbourhood First, Act East and the Indo-Pacific. Thirdly, our ties with Myanmar are age-old and multi-faceted, based on fraternal bonds at the people-to-people level and institutional, cultural and spiritual linkages. Underpinned by these considerations, India's developmental partnership with Myanmar is based on true friendship and driven by the needs and priorities of Myanmar, and no other motive. In this spirit, a diverse range of developmental initiatives and programmes have been undertaken by India across Myanmar.

Skills and Education for a Digital Tomorrow

India has helped establish four Industrial Training Centres (ITCs) in Pakokku, Myingyan, Thaton, and Monywa - training local youth in welding, electrical work, and electronics. These programs, developed in partnership with HMT (International) Limited, a leading Government of India enterprise, are tightly aligned with industry needs in Myanmar. One young trainee in Myingyan noted, "Before this centre opened, we had no way to learn these skills. Now I can work as a technician and help support my family."

Higher education has also benefitted students across Myanmar. In Mandalay, the Myanmar Institute of Information Technology (MIIT), developed with Indian assistance and modelled after IIIT-Bengaluru, is fast becoming a hub for digital excellence. Since 2018, MIIT has produced software engineers and data specialists working in tech startups across Myanmar. "Our students solve real-world problems in their final year projects. Some are now team leads in major tech firms", said an MIIT faculty member, while Theingi Shwe Sin, BE (CSE) student from the batch of 2015, commented that "Equal rights and opportunities for all students as well as the transparent system indicate the institute's preference to students' rights and education". The institute was formally handed over to the Myanmar Government in March 2022, marking a significant milestone in academic cooper-

ation. Similar stories of success have been recreated through the India-Myanmar Centre for Enhancement of IT Skills (IMCEITS), Yangon. An internship candidate from the Artificial Intelligence (AI) course stated that "The most valuable aspect of my training at IMCEITS was the hands-on practical sessions, which gave me real-world experience and helped me understand how to apply the concepts I learned in class". Similarly, India has also set up a Rice Bio-Park and Advanced Centre for Agricultural Research and Education (ACARE) in Nay Pyi Taw that aims to demonstrate the full potential of the paddy/rice value chain. The association of Indian experts with these projects has also enabled them to contribute to upgrading the post-graduate syllabus at the Yezin Agricultural University in Nay Pyi Taw.

Infrastructure that Connects and Transforms

Much of India's support has focused on local infrastructure such as the roads, bridges, water systems, and community halls that enable daily life to function more efficiently. U Tint Ko, village-tract leader of Thaphan Chaung Village in Yenanchaung Township of Magway Region, while referring to the QIP initiative of solar-powered water supply system in his village, stated, "We can now use water free of charge and abundantly. I would like to express my sincere gratitude for the support by the Government of India".

Along the quiet stretches of the India-Myanmar frontier, a powerful story is unfolding, one of roads, resilience, and renewed hope. Over the past decade, India's grant-based development cooperation has touched hundreds of communities across Myanmar, offering tangible support through over 300 projects in sectors ranging from rural infrastructure, healthcare and heritage to disaster relief and education. The guiding philosophy: PLACE PEOPLE FIRST.

Through flagship bilateral schemes like the Border Area Development Programme (BADP), Rakhine State Development Programme (RSDP), Small Development Projects (SDP) and Quick Impact Projects (QIP), India has invested more than US\$36 million

through bilateral mechanisms in Myanmar's frontier regions. This is over and above a multi-million-dollar community initiative funded and executed directly through New Delhi. From mountain villages to coastal settlements, the impact is visible and deeply felt.

BADP initiatives in Chin State and Sagaing Region have funded over 179 minor infrastructure projects across these regions.

In Rakhine, where remote villages often face infrastructural deficits, RSDP interventions have included 250 prefabricated homes and solar electrification. These are not just utility upgrades - they are enablers of dignity and opportunity.

Boosting Livelihoods Through Healthcare and Agriculture

In 2019, a 200-bedded Women & Children Hospital in Monywa was equipped with critical medical equipment, provided as Indian grant assistance. This not only elevated the standard of care but also made healthcare more accessible for families previously dependent on distant urban hospitals. Locals report shorter waiting times, better maternal care, and faster emergency responses. In the health-care field, India has also undertaken projects to upgrade facilities in the Yangon Children's Hospital and the Sittwe General Hospital. Most recently, a state-of-the-art cancer treatment device, the Bhabatron-II and Imagin Simulator, was set up at Yangon General Hospital.

India's support extends well beyond basic infrastructure. Under the Small Development Projects (SDP) initiative, rural livelihoods have received significant boosts. In Rakhine State, farmers received tractors and harvesters, which revolutionized local agriculture. "The machines helped us harvest faster and cover more land," said a farmer.

Preserving Heritage with Care and Craftsmanship

In the wake of the 2016 earthquake, India's Archaeological Survey of India took on the painstaking restoration of earthquake-damaged monuments in Bagan, after a spectacular completion of the work on the iconic Ananda Pagoda, built in the 12th century. The handing

over of restored 11 monuments under the first phase, carried out using local stonemasons, carpenters and traditional artisans, was celebrated in December 2024.

A local craftsman who worked on the project shared proudly, "We used bricks, wood and lime mortar from our villages. It was not just a job - it was a way to honour our ancestors." These restored monuments now welcome pilgrims and tourists once again, standing as testaments to shared heritage and regional solidarity.

Swift and Compassionate Disaster Response

India's cooperation is perhaps most keenly felt during a crisis. Since Cyclone Nargis in 2008, India has launched 13 major humanitarian operations in Myanmar. The most recent effort, Operation Brahma, was initiated in the aftermath of the devastating March 2025 earthquake. Within 48 hours, Indian teams arrived with tents, food, medical kits, and rescue personnel.

In Rakhine, a community leader recalled the arrival of aid: "When Cyclone Mocha struck, Indian rescue teams were here the next day with tents and medicines. We felt their support immediately; it meant everything to us."

India also provided critical supplies during the COVID-19 pandemic through Vaccine Maitri, including oxygen plants, PPE kits, and 20 million doses of COVID vaccine, reinforcing Myanmar's health infrastructure during a time of global crisis.

A Model of Community-Led Development

What makes our development partnership with Myanmar stand out is its community-first model, infrastructure built by local labour, restoration led by artisans, implementation managed by village committees and, wherever possible, materials are sourced from nearby markets, quarries, and workshops. This approach creates not just assets, but local ownership, income, and pride.

"This is more than just aid - it's empowerment," noted a project coordinator in Sagaing, "Each initiative is shaped by local needs and built by local hands."

As Myanmar marches forward and continues navigating its development path, India's engagement offers a roadmap rooted in mutual respect, sustainability, and shared responsibility. Each road laid, each clinic equipped, each monument restored is more than a project - it's a bridge between nations, with communities driven by their own aspirations.

Threads of Truth: The Fragile Ethics of Speech and Silence in Buddhist Practice

IN Buddhist ethics, the Five Precepts serve as foundational guidelines for moral conduct, intended not as commandments but as voluntary commitments to cultivate virtue and reduce suffering. Among them, the first precept—often translated as “abstain from killing”—appears deceptively simple yet harbours profound ambiguity. Unlike the other precepts, which clearly delineate behavioural boundaries (abstaining from stealing, sexual misconduct, false speech, and intoxicants), the injunction against killing invites complex interpretation. What constitutes killing? Is it limited to human life, or does it extend to animals, insects, or even the destruction of ecosystems? Does intention matter more than outcome? These questions reveal that the first precept is not merely a prohibition but a call to examine the nature of harm, agency, and compassion.

The moral terrain surrounding killing is further complicated by

cultural, historical, and situational contexts. A soldier in war; a farmer protecting crops, a doctor making end-of-life decisions—all navigate ethical grey zones where the boundaries of this precept blur. Buddhist traditions themselves diverge in interpretation: Theravada monastics may avoid even the accidental death of insects, while Mahayana practitioners might prioritize compassionate intention over literal adherence. This ambiguity is not a flaw but a feature; it invites practitioners into a deeper inquiry about the consequences of their actions and the cultivation of empathy.

In contrast, the precept against false speech lying offers a more direct moral pathway, yet its implications are no less profound. Lies are not merely distortions of fact; they are fractures in the social fabric.

When truth is compromised, trust erodes, and with it the possibility of genuine connection. Lies often serve as the gateway to greater harm, enabling theft, betrayal, violence, and systemic injustice. In this sense, dishonesty is not just a moral lapse but a structural vulnerability - a common pathway leading to tragedy.

The fallacy of lying lies in its perceived utility. People lie to protect themselves, to gain an advantage, to avoid discomfort. Yet each lie carries a hidden cost: the corrosion of integrity. Integrity is not a static trait but a dynamic alignment between one's values, actions, and speech. It is the internal coherence that allows individuals to act with clarity and purpose. Honesty, then, is not merely the absence of lies but the active presence of truthfulness — a commitment to transparency, accountability, and moral courage.

Myanmar receives War Room donated by Thailand

THE Thai government handed over the Surveillance War Room to Myanmar in Nay Pyi Taw on 15 August to monitor wildfires, smog and fine particulate matter (PM2.5), the Royal Thai Embassy to Myanmar said.

The donated quarantine room is the third of its kind in the country, after the ones in Kengtung and Tachilek.

“The operations room under the Thai-Myanmar Border Smog Management Project Phase 2 is responsible for monitoring the air pollution, especially forecasting cross-border air pollution. It will have an important role in monitoring and reporting,” Thai Ambassador Mongkol Visittump said.

It is expected to prevent the socioeconomic and health hazards caused by forest fires,

smog and PM2.5, and to upgrade capacity building.

“It is also a partnership between the two countries on environmental and public health issues in line with the Joint Plan of Action-CLEAR Sky Strategy 2024-2030,” he continued.

The observatory is designed to facilitate collaborative monitoring and information exchange between Thai and Myanmar government departments, enabling the real-time tracking of satellite heat points, wildfires, air particles, and weather information.

It will facilitate the timely implementation of relevant prevention and control measures and serve as a platform for sharing experiences in addressing air pollution issues between the two countries, the Thai Embassy said in a statement. — Htun Htun/ZN

draft history books are free from errors and misconceptions.

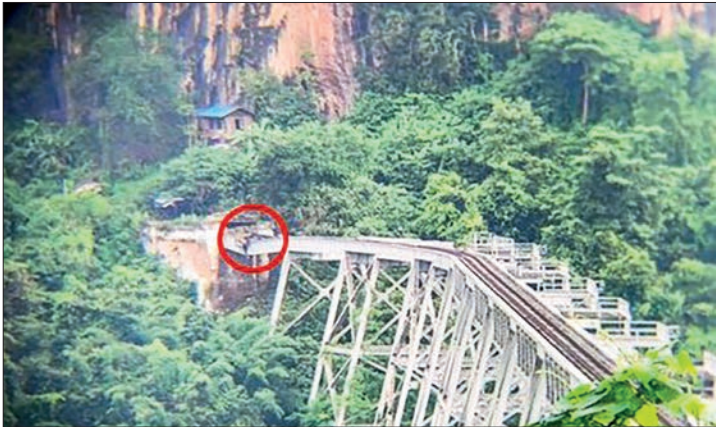

It is a call to use language as a tool for healing rather than harm.

India’s outbound investments surge 67% in FY25

INDIA’S outbound investments has jumped by 67.74 per cent to US\$41.6 billion in FY2024-25 from US\$24.8 billion in FY2023-24, as per a new EY report.

The number of transactions also rose by 15 per cent, signalling a sharp uptick in global confidence, states the report titled

“India abroad: Navigating the global landscape for overseas investment – 2025”.

It highlights that Indian companies are focusing on diversification, prioritising environmental, social, and governance (ESG) aspects, and leveraging technology-led growth

to drive their global expansion strategies. The EY report highlights sectoral impacts across IT, energy, pharma, automotive, and hospitality.

While intermediary jurisdictions like Singapore, the Netherlands, and Mauritius have long dominated outbound investment structuring, Indian companies are now broadening their horizons.

The report noted that the shift is being driven by changing global tax rules, tighter regulatory oversight, and evolving strategic priorities. Countries like the UAE, Luxembourg, and Switzerland are gaining ground, offering a mix of favorable tax regimes, progressive regulatory frameworks, and alignment with India’s interests in sustainability, digital innovation, and trade expansion. — ANI

Afghan central bank reports 21% surge in local currency value

AFGHANISTAN’S central bank Da Afghanistan Bank announced a 21 per cent rise in the value of the afghani against foreign currencies, notably the US dollar, over the past four years, crediting strategic monetary policies and expanded global banking ties, local media outlet TOLONews reported Sunday.

“Our effort is to maintain the Afghani’s stability in a better way and not allow severe fluctuations to occur in this regard,” the media quoted Hasibullah Noori, the bank’s spokesman, as saying.

According to the official, the achievement is attributed to effective monetary policies aimed at stabilizing the nation’s economy, strengthening the banking sector, and enhancing financial support systems.

These efforts are part of a broader strategy to rebuild Afghanistan’s economy. — Xinhua

Mexican president blames US migration policies for drop in July remittances

MEXICAN President Claudia Sheinbaum on Friday said US migration policies were responsible for a decrease in July remittances sent home by Mexicans living in the United States.

Sheinbaum said remittances dropped 16 per cent from June to July and are down by about 5 per cent so far in 2025, back to 2022 levels.

“Remittances increased substantially in 2023 and even more in 2024. Now we are at levels similar to 2022,” she told a daily news conference in Mexico City.

“What explains this? Above all, the policies the United States has imposed on our migrant brothers and sisters,” she said.

Sheinbaum said her government, along with Mexico’s central bank, is assessing the impact of the decline in remittances and considering measures to protect Mexican families reliant on the funds.

Sheinbaum stressed that the situation does not pose a risk to Mexico’s overall economy. — Xinhua

Amid tourism surge, 92 Japan municipalities mull accommodation tax: poll

NINETY-TWO municipal governments across Japan have considered introducing lodging taxes at hotels and traditional Japanese ryokan inns, results from a recent Kyodo News survey showed.

A total of 42 municipalities have either already introduced or plan to introduce lodging taxes, with the figure likely to rise as many aim to utilize the levies to develop tourism infrastructure amid surging inbound arrivals.

The survey conducted between June and July garnered responses from a total of 1,723 local governments, or 96 per cent.

To introduce a lodging tax, local governments must enact an ordinance and gain the approval of the Minister of Internal Affairs and Communications.



Out of the 35 governments that have already obtained approval, 12 had already implemented lodging taxes as of the end of July. The remaining 23 plan to do so by 2026.

According to the survey, at least seven local governments have already enacted ordinances and plan to obtain approval.

Though they are yet to seriously consider it, 728 municipalities said they are “interested” in introducing lodging taxes, while 506 said that they are not interested in doing so. — Kyodo

China issues interim rules on rare earth management

CHINESE authorities have unveiled a set of interim rules to strengthen the control and management of rare earth mining, smelting and separation.

The interim rules, made public on Friday, were jointly issued by the Ministry of Industry and Information Technology, the National Development and Reform Commission and the Ministry of Natural Resources.

Taking into account factors including national economic development goals, the country's rare earth reserves and their types, industry development, ecological protection, and market demand, authorities will set annual quota targets for rare earth mining, smelting and

separation, and further allocate these quotas to related firms, according to the rules.

These firms should conduct mining, smelting and separation activities within the approved quota limits, while strictly complying with laws and administrative regulations.

The rules also specify that rare earth producers should keep accurate records of product flows and upload the data to a traceability information system for rare earth products.

Local authorities have been urged to step up supervision and inspection of quota implementation and address violations in accordance with the law. — Xinhua

Nepal sees growth in remittances, forex reserves in past FY

NEPAL recorded a growth in both foreign exchange reserves and remittances in the 2024-25 fiscal year, which ended in mid-July, the central bank said on Sunday.

The forex reserves increased by 27.7 per cent to US\$19.5 billion, up from \$15.26 billion in 2023-24, the Nepal Rastra Bank said in a report.

Remittance inflows grew by 16.3 per cent year-on-year to \$12.64 billion in 2024-25.

"Based on the 2024-25 fiscal year imports, the foreign exchange reserves are sufficient to cover the prospective merchandise imports for 18.2 months and merchandise and services imports for 15.4 months," noted the report. — Xinhua

France's regulator says unable to block dead streamer's channel

THE head of France's broadcast and online regulator said on Sunday it did not have the authority to block an online channel used by a streamer who died while live-casting.

Because the channel was hosted on an Australian platform, Kick, which has no representation in France, "it does not come under the direct authority of ARCOM", the agency chief, Martin Ajdari, said in an op-ed published by Le Monde.

Kick has come under intensified scrutiny in France after a 46-year-old Frenchman died August 18 during a 12-day marathon live streaming episode

on his channel, which specialised in him enduring abuse or humiliation dished out by other participants.

A post-mortem found that the man — real name Raphael Graven, but known online as "Jean Pormanove" or "JP" — was not killed by trauma or by someone else. The cause of death was likely a medical issue, possibly in conjunction with substances, a public prosecutor, Damien Martinelli, said on Thursday. He added that Graven may have suffered from heart problems and was undergoing medical treatment for his thyroid gland. — AFP

Japan, S Korea leaders pledge “future-oriented” ties based on history

President Lee chose Japan for his first overseas trip, highlighting the significance of the Japan-South Korea relationship despite historical tensions.

JAPAN and South Korea agreed Saturday to develop bilateral relations steadily and in a “future-oriented” manner based on the “foundation” laid since their ties were normalized six decades ago, as they face common security and economic challenges.

Jae Myung agreed that the two nations, as “partners,” should step up cooperation and “strategic dialogue” over security.

Lee’s choice of Japan over the United States for his first overseas trip for bilateral talks signaled the importance he places on the relationship despite strains over wartime history and territory. Once known for his firm stance, as president, he has taken a more pragmatic approach toward Japan, with which South Korea shares the United States as a common ally.

During the nearly two-hour summit, Ishiba said he stands by the views on history expressed by his predecessors, a symbolic move underscoring the weight history still carries for both countries 80 years after the end of World War II. — Kyodo

Death toll from Gaza famine rises to 281

THE total number of deaths from malnutrition in the Gaza Strip caused by Israel’s blockade of aid access has risen to 281 people, including 114 children, the Gaza health ministry said on Saturday.

“Over the past 24 hours, the Gaza health ministry has registered eight deaths from hunger and malnutrition, including two children. This brings the total death toll from starvation to 281 with 114 children,” the statement read.

On Friday, the UN World Food Programme (WFP) confirmed catastrophic levels of famine in the Gaza Strip for the first time since the conflict began in 2023. According to the UN Integrated Food Security Phase Classification (IPC), there are five phases of malnutrition, with phases from three to five marking severe food deprivation. — SPUTNIK

Europe halts US-bound parcels over tax rule shake-up

MULTIPLE postal operators across Europe are suspending most package shipments to the United States, citing uncertainty, confusion and rising costs linked to forthcoming US customs regulations on low-value imports.

DHL Group, Germany’s largest postal and logistics company, announced Friday it will temporarily stop accepting commercial goods and certain private parcels to the United States through postal channels.

The decision follows an executive order signed by US President Donald Trump last month, which sets to abolish the longstanding “de minimis” rule that allowed duty-free imports of low-value goods worth up to \$800.

Under the new framework, effective 29 August all imported items will be subject to customs clearance and tariffs. DHL noted, however, that the measure will not affect gifts under 100 dollars exchanged between in-

dividuals, if clearly marked as such, nor the mailing of letters and documents, though these may face stricter controls. Shipments sent via DHL Express

will remain available but must undergo standard tariff-based clearance. DHL also said the suspension was unavoidable, as key details of the new customs

procedures remain unclear. Without guarantees of smooth clearance, the company cannot process shipments reliably. — Xinhua

WWII film “Dongji Rescue” debuts in North America

THE World War II (WWII) film “Dongji Rescue” was officially released in a number of major cities across North America on Friday.

The highly-anticipated film is based on a true story that took place in October 1942, when the Lisbon Maru, a cargo ship requisitioned by the Japanese army to transport more than 1,800 British prisoners of war (POWs) from Hong Kong to Japan, was torpedoed by a US submarine off the Zhoushan Islands in China’s Zhejiang Province. Local fishermen from Dongji Island risked their lives to rescue more than 300 of the POWs.

Released by Well Go USA Entertainment in Mandarin with English subtitles, the film is being shown in about 70 theatres across dozens of North American cities, including Los Angeles, San Francisco, Las Vegas, Chicago, New York, Boston, Toronto and Vancouver. — Xinhua

Team Myanmar honoured for 2nd place at ASEAN Women’s Championship

Chinese veteran Xiaohai defends Street Fighter 6 crown at Esports World Cup

CHINESE fighting game veteran Zeng Zhuojun, also known as Xiaohai, successfully defended his title at the 2025 Esports World Cup (EWC) in Riyadh on Sunday, edging Chilean teenager Derek Blaz 5-4 in the Street Fighter 6 final.

The 33-year-old, representing KuaiShou Gaming, pocketed US\$250,000 with the victory, becoming only the third player in EWC history to claim back-to-back championships.

The grand final showcased a clash

of generations. Zeng relied on his experience and adaptability to withstand the fearless challenge of 15-year-old Blaz, who had advanced to the title match after eliminating several world-class opponents. — Xinhua

Arteta backs Eze to create 'magic moments' at Arsenal

NEW recruit Eberechi Eze will create "magic moments" and take Arsenal to a different level, according to Gunners manager Mikel Arteta.

Eze was presented to the Emirates crowd shortly before Arsenal’s 5-0 thrashing of Leeds that took the north London club to the top of the Premier League table early in the season.

The England international has signed a four-year contract in a deal that could be worth up to £68 million (\$92 million) after Arsenal scuppered his proposed move to their arch north London rivals Tottenham Hotspur.

The 27-year-old did not arrive in time to face Leeds, but with both Bukayo Saka and Martin Odegaard sustaining injuries in Arsenal’s second win in as many matches, Eze could be handed his Gunners debut against reigning champions Liverpool at Anfield next Sunday. — AFP

Laos expands eco-friendly mosquito method to combat dengue

IN the fight against dengue, Laos is expanding the release of Wolbachia-infected mosquitoes, a safe and effective method that turns mosquitoes into tiny warriors against the virus.

In early August, Wolbachia-infected mosquitoes were released across seven districts of the capital Vientiane. The move builds on the success of a pilot project in 2022, which saw the deployment of Wolbachia mosquitoes in several areas of the city, protecting 32 villages and nearly 86,000 people.

Wolbachia is a natural and safe bacterium that reduces the ability of dengue-carrying Aedes aegypti mosquitoes to transmit viruses between people. The bacteria-carrying mosquitoes breed with the wild Aedes aegypti mosquitoes in the area, passing Wolbachia to their offspring.

Many citizens have expressed strong support for the ongoing efforts, particularly among those who value environmental protection.

Khonesavanh, a resident of Laos, praised the government's eco-friendly approach to combating dengue fever, emphasizing its dual benefit of protecting public health and the environment. — Xinhua
