Manufacturing exports hit over US\$1.1B in 2 months

THE exports from the manufacturing sector totalled over US\$1.146 billion in the past two months of the current financial year 2024-2025 beginning 1 April 2024, indicating a sharp drop of \$150.68 million compared with that of the FY 2023-2024, the Ministry of Commerce's statistics showed.

The finished industrial goods export swelled to \$1.297 billion in the corresponding period last FY 2023-2024. Myanmar transports manufacturing goods to foreign markets through two modes of transport (sea and land border).

Myanmar exports agricultural products, livestock products, fisheries, minerals, forest products, finished industrial goods and other goods. At the same time, it imports capital goods, intermediate goods, raw materials for CMP garment factories and consumer goods. Myanmar has been implementing the National Export Strategy (NES) 2020-2025 in order to bolster exports. The priority sectors of the NES comprise agricultural production, garment and apparel, industrial and electronic device, fishery business, forest product, digital manufacturing and service, logistic service, quality management, trade information service, innovation and entrepreneurship sectors. — NN/EM

Of the 8,428 candidates who took the exam in the Nay Pyi Taw council area, 4,786 were successful, and the pass rate was 56.79 per cent.

Help child labour escape nightmare lives

LL countries, including Myanmar, must prioritize ending child labour as part of the 2024 mission: "Let's act on our commitments: End Child Labour!" This initiative calls for global empathy and action to alleviate the suffering of children trapped in exploitative labour conditions.

World Day against Child Labour, observed on 12 June, marks the 25th anniversary of the Worst Forms of Child Labour Convention (1999, No 182). This day serves as a reminder for all stakeholders to enhance the enforcement of Convention No 182 and Convention No 138, which set minimum age requirements for employment and work.

Hence, now is the time to save children from the life of child labour. Relevant governments and authorities have to create proper environments and opportunities for children while addressing various difficulties the families of children face. Actually, only when society nurtures children will they escape from child labour.

Despite progress in reducing child labour, recent global trends have reversed, highlighting the urgent need to accelerate efforts to eliminate child labour in all forms. The international community, aligned with Sustainable Development Goal Target 8.7, is committed to eradicating child labour by 2025, aiming to improve the lives of millions of children.

Currently, many children are coerced into work or bear workloads inappropriate for their age. Various factors, such as parental livelihood challenges and family hardships, contribute to the prevalence of child labour. Society must protect these children from forced labour. Law enforcement bodies are crucial in ensuring these children enjoy their rights and are shielded from exploitation.

Regions like Africa, Asia and the Pacific are home to

nearly 90 per cent of the world's child labourers. The remaining children in labour are found in the Americas (11 million), Europe and Central Asia (6 million), and the Arab States (1 million). In terms of incidence, five per cent of children are in labour in the Americas, 4 per cent in Europe and Central Asia, and 3 per cent in the Arab States.

The international community must renew its commitment to ending child labour. Governments, NGOs, and other stakeholders must collaborate to enforce laws, provide education, and support families to ensure children are free from the burdens of labour and can enjoy their childhoods. Efforts should focus on addressing the root causes of child labour, such as poverty and lack of education, while also enforcing strict regulations against exploitation.

Hence, now is the time to save children from the life of child labour. Relevant governments and authorities have to create proper environments and opportunities for children while addressing various difficulties the families of children face. Actually, only when society nurtures children will they escape from child labour.

HERE has been an in-creasing number of modern-day language learners as polyglots in the world year after year. The simple reason is that languages play a 'must' role in taking up their study, business, and many others. Apart from English, some language learners have mastered Chinese and Japanese since they were of school age. Then, whether it is easy or difficult to learn a language automatically becomes an interesting question. For instance, many of its learners find Japanese difficult, but after that, why on earth have most of them been able to know this language? Quite indeed, there are usually more or less difficulties for a student learning a language. Despite this, language learning difficulties are seen as several reasons why students cannot afford it well.

Of course, learning concepts of a language is quite straightforward. As for language acquisition, a native speaker will first improve his listening skills. Only after having an ear for the language can he speak it very well, then read and write. As for language learning, an international student likes to begin any skill that they want to. Foreign

Great Difficulties of Learning a Second Language

learners may start speaking and writing skills before acquiring a good command of listening and reading skills. Simply and clearly, speaking skills will certainly develop after enough study of listening skills, and reading and writing skills will also develop. If not, learning a language should take more time than is needed. Likewise, a foreign learner likes depending on the translation method more than the direct method in the study of a language. However, this does not mean that the translation method is of no use to language learners. Hence, the more a foreign language learner relies on the direct method, the better the linguistic achievement will be.

Next, many language learners unerringly tend to meet the mother tongue barrier, especially grammatical patterns of writing. That is, when language learners write something in a second language, they are given to mix it up with their first language. For

example, the sentence structure `I am the youngest son in my family' would be proper about the use of the preposition `in' instead of `of' for Myanmar Grammar, but this structure is grammatically wrong for English because the phrase `my family' is not a place in the structure. In fact, the grammatical forms of languages may be similar to each other but rarely identical. Psychologically speaking, in education, this is just nothing but a proactive inhibition of the learning process; the first language barrier exerts an immense effect on learning the second language. That can also be called an un-language expression, which means a careless mistake over the second language confused with the first language. Thus, vocabulary richness, lexical demands, loanwords, spelling errors, dictation, word choice and usages are potentially challenging problems of second language learning.

When learning a language,

most language students must deal with pronunciation inaccuracies of the language. As a foreign learner, it is not surprising that he cannot reasonably language accurately or correctly. Phonetic symbols are used in almost all languages, and if language learners have well-developed proficiency in these phonetic symbols, they will be able to pronounce language words correctly. In the English language, the prefix `non-' must be seen as pronounced with difficulty by many learners from different corners of the globe. Strangely, some foreign learners are under the illusion that their pronunciation is just the same as that of a native speaker. Indeed, there is no way a foreign learner can afford the pronunciation of all words in a second language like the natives. In spite of this, any learner has to enunciate the words of a second language slowly and carefully, especially those of the language

under the control of one of their "uncles". They dare not say a word!

ten go hand in hand, meaning that if language is studied, its respective culture always should. Some language expressions are not always suitable for different nations' cultures. In English culture, the expression `How old are you?' should not be used between two people who are not well acquainted with each other, whereas that is not amazing in Myanmar culture. However, the questions `Are you married?' and `Do you have a life partner?' are spoken frankly in English culture, though these are not frequently asked questions in Myanmar culture. The expression `I'm afraid' does not place emphasis on offering an apology in English culture, although it is used in Myanmar culture. Noticeably enough, the salutation How are you?' greeted by the American people is mostly the same as the expression `How do you do?' and `Hello' sometimes. Second language learners can manage to overcome culture

shock or culture bumps and even taboo words while studying the language.

All in all, a second language learner will most likely run into learning difficulties to some extent. It would be better if the second language learner stays in a language-speaking country for two years or so. If it is not okay, he can always choose and study audio files or books by native speakers in every sense of the word. Almost all second language learners ought to require a min imum time of six months for language proficiency on a one-hourper-day basis, at the very least without fail. After all, any foreign learner is able to overcome the great difficulties of conducting a second language study with all attention and effort. In some cases, language can be a major obstacle to winning a scholarship or finding a job. Having studied as many second languages as possible is never in vain for sure.

DICA report: 2,000 companies fail to file AR in May 2024



off the register in May 2024 as they failed to submit annual returns (AR) on the online registry system, MyCO, according to the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA). The DICA notified any registered company that fails to file its AR on the MyCO that it is to be struck off the register from the date of the directive, under 430 (F) of the Myanmar Companies Law, according to the DICA's notification. The DICA's statistics showed that 750 companies in January 2024, 600 in February, 1,650 in March and 2,000 in April did not file the AR. A total of 6,400 companies also failed to submit the AR in 2023. The registration and re-registration of companies on the MyCO website commenced on 1 August 2018 under the Myanmar Com-

submit AR on the MyCO registry system within two months of incorporation and at least once every year (not later than one month after the anniversary of the

months of incorporation or face a fine of K100,000 for filing late returns.

The DICA has notified that any company which fails to submit its AR within 13 months will be notified of its suspension (I-9A). If it fails to submit the AR within 28 days of receiving the notice, the system will show the company's status as suspended. Companies can restore their status only after shelling out a fine of K50,000 for the AR fee, K100,000 for restoration of the company on the register, and K100,000 for late filing of documents, totalling K250,000. If a company fails to restore its status within six months of suspension, the registrar will strike its name off the Register, according to the DICA notice. - NN/EM

Malaysia's natural rubber production down 20.9% on month in April

MALAYSIA'S natural rubber production decreased by 20.9 per cent in April to 21,325 tons as compared to 26,966 tonnes in March, official data showed Tuesday.

Year-on-year comparison showed that the production of natural rubber fell 9.1 per cent from 23,460 tonnes a year ago, the Department of Statistics Malaysia said in a statement.

Total stocks of natural rubber in April declined 5.1 per cent to 211,119 tonnes as compared to 222,455 tonnes in March.

Exports of Malaysia's natural

rubber amounted to 47,796 tonnes in April 2024, down 18.9 per cent as against 58,965 tonnes in March.

China remained the main destination for natural rubber exports, which accounted for 44.8 per cent of total exports in April. This was followed by India (11.4 per cent), Germany (eight per cent), the United Arab Emirates (4.3 per cent), and Pakistan (3.9 per cent).

The export performance was contributed by natural rubber-based products such as gloves, tires, tubes, and rubber thread. — Xinhua

Russian grain exporters to focus on markets in Middle East, N Africa

RUSSIA'S Ministry of Agriculture said Tuesday that the country's grain exporters will shift their focus to key markets in the Middle East and North Africa, and strengthen relationships with India and China.

During a meeting led by Russian Agriculture Minister Oksana Lut with grain exporters, it was unanimously agreed that Türkiye's import refusal would not affect Russia's export capabilities, the ministry said. The consensus was that for the upcoming season, starting on 1 July, Russia plans to reduce its grain supply to the global market to 60 million tonnes.

"In the current conditions,

domestic exporters will focus on the key markets of the Middle East and North Africa, as well as on the development of relations with India and China, where there is progress in the supply of grain legumes and broad prospects for grain crops are opening up," the ministry said.

The ministry also said that considering last year's high yield, Russia aims to deliver up to 70 million tonnes of grains to the global markets, including 53 million tonnes of wheat, in the ongoing season, which concludes on 30 June. Currently, one in every four wheat shipments on the global market originates from Russia. — Xinhua

Brazil's market upgrades 2024 economic growth forecast to 2.09%

BRAZIL'S financial market raised its gross domestic product (GDP) growth forecast for this year from 2.05 per cent to 2.09 per cent and maintained it at two per cent for 2025, Brazil's Central Bank announced Monday.

According to the bank's Focus survey of the country's main financial institutions, the market has regained a more optimistic view of economic activity following five weeks of downward projections.

Market analysts slightly

raised the inflation forecast, from 3.88 per cent to 3.90 per cent in 2024 and from 3.77 per cent to 3.78 per cent for 2025, in both cases falling within the official target rate of three per cent with a margin of tolerance of 1.5 percentage points up or down.

Economists kept their forecast for the Selic benchmark interest rate at 10.25 per cent for end of 2024 but raised it from 9.18 per cent to 9.25 per cent for end of 2025, with the rate currently at 10.50 per cent annually.

Regarding the exchange market for Brazil's currency, currently trading at 5.37 reals to the US dollar, the forecast expects 5.05 to the dollar at end of 2024 and 5.09 to the dollar at end of 2025.

A trade surplus of 82.51 billion dollars is expected for this year and 78 billion dollars for next year. Foreign direct investment in Brazil is expected to reach 70 billion dollars in 2024 and 72.5 billion dollars in 2025. — Xinhua

Production starts at Senegal's first offshore oil field

of oil-producing countries on Tuesday as Australian group Woodside Energy announced that production had started in the west African country's first offshore project.

While Senegal's fossil fuel

output is not expected to be as high as that of bigger producers such as Nigeria, there are hopes the oil and gas industry will bring billions of dollars in revenue to the country and contribute to transforming its

economy.

"This is a historic day for Senegal and for Woodside," said the company's chief executive, Meg O'Neill, calling the extraction of "first oil" from the Sangomar field "a key milestone".

The floating facility is moored about 100 kilometres (60 miles) offshore. The vessel has a storage capacity of 1.3 million barrels, Woodside said. The deepwater project aims to produce 100,000 bar-

rels of oil per day. The field also contains natural gas.

Woodside has an 82-percent stake in the deepwater project with the remainder held by Senegal's state-owned energy company Petrosen.

The discovery of oil and gas fields in 2014 raised great hopes for the developing country, with state-owned energy firm Petrosen expecting the sector to generate more than \$1 billion per year over the next three decades. — AFP

Russia, Belarus embark on second stage of non-strategic nuclear drills — Defence Ministry

THE drills have the objective of safeguarding the sovereignty and territorial integrity of the Union State. Previously, troops underwent training to operate Iskander missiles and to equip Kinzhal hypersonic missiles with specialized warheads.

The second stage of drills focusing on the use of non-strategic nuclear weapons by Russian and Belarusian forces has commenced, the Russian Defence Ministry said on Tuesday. During the exercise, the joint training of units from the armed forces of Russia and Belarus will be carried out. The second stage of the non-strategic nuclear forces drills is aimed at maintaining readiness to use nuclear weapons to ensure the sovereignty of the Union State of Russia and Belarus, the Russian Ministry of Defence added.

As part of the first stage,

Cambodia to restore centuries-old temple's causeway

CAMBODIA has prepared to restore the structure of the eastern causeway of Beng Mealea temple in the famed Angkor Archaeological Park, under the Lancang-Mekong Cooperation (LMC) Special Fund, the APSARA National Authority (ANA) said in a news release on Tuesday.

Puth Soth, a technical officer of the ANA's Department of Conservation of Monuments and Preventive Archaeology, said a technical team is conducting an archaeological excavation on the structure of the temple's eastern causeway for a restoration project. "After excavating the topsoil layer, we found that the floor of the causeway had collapsed, with the weakened foundations tearing apart, causing some components of the structure such as pillars, a Naga balustrade, a Naga's body, a Naga's head, and many fragments falling into the moat and some buried in the ground due to age and natural factors," said Soth, who led the excavation work.

He added that when the excavation is completed, a restoration project on the causeway will be launched under the LMC Special Fund. — Xinhua

Indian PM Modi releases instalment of farmers income support

INDIAN Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Monday released the 17th instalment of the PM Kisan Samman Nidhi, or PM Farmers Tribute Fund, worth 200 billion Indian rupees (US\$2.39 billion).

This was the first file signed by Modi on his first day in office in his third consecutive term as the prime minister of the South Asian country.

The fund would be distributed among nearly 93 million Indian farmers.

"This will benefit 9.3 crore farmers and distribute around INR 20,000 crores. After signing the file, PM Modi said ours is a government fully committed to Kisan Kalyan (farmers' welfare). It is therefore fitting that the first file signed on taking charge is related to farmer welfare. We want to keep working even more for the farmers and the agriculture sector in the times to come," said a press release issued by the Prime Minister's Office. — Xinhua

Singapore Airlines offers compensation to turbulence-hit victims

SINGAPORE Airlines (SIA) has offered 10,000 US dollars to passengers who suffered minor injuries on board of the turbulence-hit flight SQ321 in May, the company said Tuesday.

SIA would invite passengers who sustained serious injuries to discuss a compensation offer to meet their specific circumstances.

"Flesh-eating" bacterium cases hit record high in Japan

STREPTOCOCCAL toxic shock syndrome, a potentially deadly disease caused by a "flesh-eating" bacterium, is spreading rapidly in Japan, with cases in the first half of this year already surpassing last year's record, a national infectious disease institute said Tuesday.

There have been 977 cases of the disease

caused by the bacterium called streptococcus pyogenes which is often associated with strep throat but occasionally leads to limb necrosis and multiple organ failure. The number of people infected has already topped last year's 941, the highest annual number of cases tallied since mandatory reporting began in 1999, according to the institute. — Kyodo

UNDISPUTED world super bantamweight boxing champion Naoya Inoue said Monday he wants to fight in the United States again.

"I feel like my name recognition has increased, and I want to have a match in the United States again," Inoue, nicknamed "Monster", said at Tokyo's Haneda airport upon his return from New York. The 31-year-old attended an awards ceremony in New York after winning the Sugar Ray Robinson Award as the Boxing Writers Association of America's Fighter of the Year for 2023.

Inoue last fought in the United States in June 2021, when he stopped top-ranked Filipino contender Michael Dasmarinas in the third round in Las Vegas.

Plant breeding skills shortage dire threat to food security**: study**

A shortage of scientists specialized in plant breeding could threaten global food security, an international research led by Australia's national science agency has warned.

According to a joint study published on Tuesday by the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organization (CSIRO), Canada's McGill University and Lincoln University in New Zealand, a lack of skilled plant breeders could have dire implications for food security around the world.

Plant breeding is the science of changing the traits of plants to improve their genetic potential. It is used to improve the quality of nutrition in produce and underpins the global production of food for animals and humans as well as fuel and fiber.

The new research found that skills shortages in plant breeding have been growing for some time and must urgently be addressed to maintain current levels of agricultural, fibre and feed production. "What we're seeing is a whole generation of highly-skilled plant breeding specialists who are now reaching retirement age, with a gap left as university graduates opt to focus on other areas of plant science including molecular biology," Lucy Egan, lead author of the study from the CSIRO, said in a media release. — Xinhua

UN Security Council adopts resolution calling for immediate ceasefire in Gaza

HE UN Security Council on Monday adopted a resolution aimed at reaching a comprehensive ceasefire deal in three phases to end the war in Gaza.

Adopted by a large majority with 14 votes in favour and Russia abstaining, Resolution 2735 also urges both parties to the conflict to fully implement the terms of the proposal "without delay and without condition". According to the resolution, phase one includes an "immediate, full,

and complete ceasefire with the release of hostages including women, the elderly and the wounded, the return of the remains of some hostages who have been killed, and the exchange of Palestinian prisoners".

It calls for the withdrawal of Israeli forces from "populated areas" of Gaza, the return of Palestinians to their homes and neighbourhoods throughout the enclave, including in the north, as well as the safe and effective distribution of humanitarian assistance at scale. Phase two would see a permanent end to hostilities "in exchange for the release of all other hostages still in Gaza, and a full withdrawal of Israeli forces from Gaza". In phase three, "a major multi-year reconstruction plan for Gaza" would begin and the remains of any deceased hostages still in Gaza would be returned to Israel. The council also underlined the proposal's provision that if negotiations take longer than six weeks for phase one, the ceasefire will continue as long as negotiations continue. — Xinhua
