
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Athletes must foster unity and mutual trust

Mr Sofiane Chaib was born on 5 September 1986. He obtained a Diploma from the National School of Administration of Algiers, a Master's degree from Jean-Moulin Lyon University, France, and a Doctorate from the French Institute of Geopolitics, France.

He served in various positions as Head of Office, Directorate General Europe in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs from August 2008 to August 2011, as Cabinet Attaché to the Minister of Maghreb and African Affairs and League of Arab States from August 2015 to May 2017, as Cabinet Attaché to the Minister of Foreign Affairs from June 2017 to August 2017, as Counsellor at the Secretary-General and the Special Envoy in charge of the National Community Abroad from August 2021 to May 2022, as Deputy Director at International Economic, Financial and Commercial Affairs, General Directorate of Multilateral Relations from June 2022 to November 2022, and as Director at Cabinet of the Secretary-General of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and the National Community Abroad from December 2022 to April 2024. As overseas assignments, he served as Diplomatic Attaché at the Embassy of Algeria in Morocco from September 2011 to July 2015 and as First Secretary at the Embassy of Algeria in Belgium from September 2017 to July 2021. From July 2024 to date, he has been serving as Ambassador of the People's Democratic Republic of Algeria to the Socialist Republic of Vietnam. — MNA

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

Myanmar pursues UNESCO Global Geopark

EFFORTS are being made for Mount Popa National Geopark to be recognized as one of the 213 UNESCO Global Geoparks.

Mount Popa National Park was declared the country's first national geopark on 6 December 2023. The site is rich in geosites and biodiversities and is a promising area for tourism development. Currently, it has 15 geosites, and 15 new geosites are being developed.

The proposed 15 new geosites are Popa Tuff, Popa Taungkalat, Kyauk Koepwint Hill, Petrified Sal, Taungnauk Hill, Kyetmauktaung Dam, Hotel Linn Museum, Lahar, Augite Andesite Stone Forest, Sinzin Pyroclastic Bed and Waterfall, Ngwetwin Hill, Shwetwin Hill, Hillside Village (North) Toreva Block, Myauktaw Totrsa Block, Chaungphya Ancient Iron Furnace and Royal Elephant Camp.

Among them, Popa Taungkalat, Kyauk Koepwint Hill, Augite Andesite Stone Forest, Kyetmauktaung Dam, Hotel Linn Museum, Ngwetwin Hill, Chaungphya Ancient Iron Furnace and Royal Elephant Camp are recognized as additional

eight geosites.

"Myanmar does not possess global geopark, but some ASE-AN countries do. We declared Mount Popa National Park as a national geopark. It contains 15 geosites, and we are trying hard to become a UNESCO Global Geopark. We completed field studies to place the road directions and notice boards in these 15 geosites from 16 to 21 September. We also recognized eight out of 15 proposed geosites. If a nation has a geopark, it can bring benefits such as environmental conservation, research, tourism, and job opportunities. It is also a source of pride for the country," said U Zaw Win Lwin, staff officer of Geological Survey and Mineral Exploration.

At present, 213 geoparks are found in 48 countries. In Asia, 44 geoparks were found in China, whereas ten were in Indonesia, two in Thailand, two in Malaysia and one in the Philippines. — Nyein Thu (MNA)/KTZH

Thumb replantation performed successfully at Yangon General Hospital

THE medical team of Yangon General Hospital successfully performed a thumb replantation operation on 30 July.

The patient was Maung Sai Zaw Htike, 26, who lives in Hlinethaya Township, Yangon. He encountered a cutting accident at his workplace, the construction site, and got right thumb traumatic amputation.

He was taken to Yangon General Hospital, and the thumb replantation was started at 7:35 pm and completed at 11:35 pm on that day.

The thumb replantation was performed by a hand operation group led by Dr Khine May Oo, Dr Ye Naing Oo and Dr Min Min Aung, an anaesthetic team led by Dr Darli Soe Win, Dr Htet Aung Lin and Dr Aung Ko Ko and nurse team led by Daw Poe Khant Htoo and Daw Hnin Eainzali.

As the health condition and blood circulation of the right thumb showed improvement, he was allowed to be discharged on 12 August (after 13 days of replantation). Moreover, the healthcare service was provided to him as an outpatient, and the thumb was in normal condition after 28 days of replantation. — MNA/KTZH

Phyusin Myitta to donate K127.5M worth of roofing sheets to villages in Tatkon Township

THE Phyusin Myitta Philanthropic Association (Yangon) is set to donate roofing sheets worth K127.5 million to villages submerged by flooding in Tatkon Township, according to sources.

The Phyusin Myitta Philanthropic Association (Yangon) donated 20 roofing sheets (valued at 500,000 kyats) per house to 22 houses in Yetwinphyu village, 23 houses in Nyaungbintha village, five houses in Chaungkhwa village, 27 houses in Naungkham village, ten houses in Letpankone village, and 13 houses in Shaukone village, all located in Tatkon Township, which were affected by the floods.

Furthermore, the association

will continue donating roofing sheets to 10 houses in Gyogon village, 15 houses in Phaungtaw village, 16 houses in Thitseintpin village, 66 houses in Ngatezu village, 16 houses in Letpanpu village, 27 houses in Kangyi village, five houses in Thayetoak village, and houses in Kinthalankwe village, according to the association's announcement.

"We will provide 20 roofing sheets per house to a total of 255 households, amounting to a total donation of 127.5 million kyats. I have personally contributed 50 million kyats, and together with our partner organizations such as Setkarnwel (Bago), Anagut Kwelpwint Blood Donor Asso-



Belgium leads Myanmar rice imports in first 5 months this FY

BELGIUM is ranked first in leading countries that import Myanmar's rice and broken rice, with over 162,900 tonnes in the first five months of the current financial year 2024-2025, beginning 1 April, according to the Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF).

China is placed as the second largest buyer of Myanmar rice, with 157,200 tonnes, followed by Indonesia, which has over 145,000 tonnes.

Myanmar also sent 26,500 tonnes of rice to Mozambique, over 19,500 tonnes to Spain and 16,500 tonnes to the Netherlands.

Myanmar's rice and broken rice exports hit over 718,000 tonnes in April-August 2024, with an estimated value of \$353 million.

The federation aims to achieve 2.5 million tonnes of rice exports in the 2024-2025 financial year (April-March).

The Ministry of Commerce

has been cooperating with departments and institutions concerned to achieve export targets and beyond depending on the supply volume of rice, broken rice, pulses, corn, rubber and fisheries from the respective companies.

Ministry of Commerce is

working together with the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry, Myanmar Rice Federation, Myanmar Pulses, Beans, Maize and Sesame Seeds Merchants Association, Myanmar Garment Manufacturers Association, Myanmar Industries Association,

Myanmar Rubber Planters and Producers Association, Myanmar Fisheries Products Processors and Exporters Association to meet monthly export targets and facilitate exports.

The Central Bank of Myanmar's monetary policy to control export earnings impeded rice exports, hurting exporters financially. The El Nino weather condition also hampered rice export, the chairman of the Myanmar Rice Federation affirmed.

The federation aimed to achieve 2.5 million tonnes of rice export in the FY 2023-2024, generating earnings of one billion dollars. However, rice exports fell short of the target with 1.6 million tonnes worth \$845 million.

The Central Bank of Myanmar's monetary policy to control export earnings impeded rice exports, hurting exporters financially. The El Nino weather condition also hampered rice export, the chairman of the Myanmar Rice Federation affirmed.

Myanmar exported 2,261,203 tonnes of rice and broken rice to foreign trade partners in the past 2022-2023 FY (April-March), with an estimated value of \$853.472 million. — NN/KK

Flood submerges 55,000 acres of crops in Nay Pyi Taw Council Area MORE than 55,000 acres of various crops, including 50,000 This photo shows a submerged location.

MORE than 55,000 acres of various crops, including 50,000 monsoon paddy fields, were submerged in Nay Pyi Taw council area.

As of 21 September, over 30,000 acres of flooded fields were affected, and 20,000 were damaged. Post-flood farm recovery and repair works are systematically carried out in flood-hit fields so as not to impact crop yields.

Strong wind and torrential rains in Nay Pyi Taw caused flooding in paddy fields. The Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation demonstrated how to use inputs (fertilizer, nutrients) in the flood-hit fields for farm recovery in Kyopin village, Zeyathiri Township, Nay Pyi Taw on 23 September.

The Union Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation addressed that overflowing lakes, ponds and dams triggered by heavy rains and impacts of the typhoon in September caused devastating floods in paddy fields. He urged the farmers to replant them if they are connected to irrigation channels.

The ministry has prepared rice seedlings to provide them to farmers in need. The growers can contact the nearest Agriculture Department to get access to pedigree seeds of other crops and ploughing requirements. The farmers need to cooperate in farm recovery efforts and replanting in flood-battered paddy fields to mitigate the impacts on yield. He reiterated that today's demonstration on how to repair the flood-hit fields aimed to encourage farmers to replant them after learning the knowhow of post-flood recovery man-

Afterwards, the chairman

of the Nay Pyi Taw Council Area discussed matters regarding crop damage conditions, food security, replanting crops to mitigate loss of farmers' income and Nay Pyi Taw Council's cooperation with related departments in farm recovery activities.

The director-general of the Agriculture Department explained pest control measures in flood-stricken areas, agricultural input methods to repair the damaged fields and farmers' awareness of farming technologies.

The Union minister and chairman of the Nay Pyi Taw Council Area provided urea, potash and Rock Phosphate fertilizer to farmers from Zeyathiri, Pobbathiri, Ottarathiri, Pyinmana, Lewe and Tatkon townships at the event. — NN/KK

Breakthrough Blood **Test Identifies Children** at Risk of Obesity-**Related Diseases**

The study contests the common idea that cholesterol is the leading cause of complications around obesity in children, identifying new lipid molecules that contribute to health risks like blood pressure, which are not solely correlated with a child's weight.

CIENTISTS have developed a novel blood test that uses lipids to identify children who are more susceptible to obesity-related problems, such as type 2 diabetes, liver, and heart disease.

A novel link between lipids and disorders affecting children's metabolism has been discovered by King's College London researchers. and this finding may provide an early warning system for ailments including liver disease. The study was published in Nature Medicine.

The researchers propose that this could assist medical professionals in identifying early disease indicators in children more quickly and facilitating their access to the appropriate treatment by using blood plasma testing machines already in use in hospitals.

The findings also contest the common idea that cholesterol is a leading cause of complications around obesity in children, identifying new lipid molecules which contribute to health risks like blood pressure but are not only correlated with a child's weight.

Lipids have traditionally been thought to be fatty acids in the body, either good or bad types of cholesterol or triglycerides, fats found in the bloodstream that is the most common in the human body. Recent studies from the same group of scientists have suggested that the picture is more complex. Using a technique associated with chemistry called mass spectrometry, current evidence puts the types of different lipid present in the body in the thousands, each with separate functions.

Taking a control sample of 1,300 children with obesity, the team assessed their lipids in blood. Afterwards 200 of them were put on the HOLBAEK-model for a year, a lifestyle intervention for people with obesity popular in Denmark.

Relief efforts, healthcare services ongoing in flood-hit areas

IN response to the recent floods affecting various regions, including Nay Pyi Taw Union Territory, coordinated relief and rehabilitation efforts remain in full swing. As of yesterday, relief activities were actively conducted in Zeyathiri, Pyinmana, Tatkon, Lewe, and Pobbathiri townships, as well as in Shan State (South), particularly Kalaw, Langkho, and Maukmai townships. Similar efforts are also underway in Loikaw, Kayah State, Thazi Township in

IN response to the recent Mandalay Region, and Tounfloods affecting various regoo Township in Bago Region.

These efforts involve relocating affected people to safer areas, cleaning public spaces, and clearing debris such as fallen trees and logs left behind by the floodwaters. Local authorities and social teams, in collaboration with locals, are actively addressing these challenges.

In the temporary flood shelters, health teams are providing essential medical care and conducting health awareness sessions for displaced people. Contributions of relief items, including clothing, daily necessities, food, and donations from Tatmadaw (Army, Navy, and Air), government departments, organizations, and private donors, continue to flow into the affected regions. Additionally, Sangha (Buddhist monks) are also receiving support through donations.

The Nay Pyi Taw Council chairman, regional commanders from the military headquarters, and other officials are visiting the affected areas to oversee relief efforts and provide necessary assistance. Food supplies, relief materials, and financial aid are being distributed to those in need.

In parallel, repair work are underway on roads and bridges damaged by the flooding. Temporary Bailey bridges are being installed to restore transportation links as quickly as possible. The remaining bridges will be repaired promptly to restore normalcy in these regions. — MNA/KZL

Tatmadaw accused of forcing monks to disrobe for conscription in Magway

MALICIOUS media outlets intentionally spread fake news, claiming that Tatmadaw detained youths by force for recruitment in Wetmasut village-tract in Yenangyaung Township, Magway Region, and youths and men fled their regions, some entered into monkhood, and Tatmadaw raided the monastery to detain monks for conscription.

The media circulate such misinformation to disturb relations between the public and Tatmadaw. Currently, the people's military servant training courses are successfully conducted, and it reaches Training 5, and those who completed the training serve duties at their designated places. Therefore, subversive media outlets fabricate news stories to mislead the public, said an official. — MNA/KTZH

Flood-stricken villages west of Inlay Lake still require aid

LOCATED at the west of Inlay Lake in Shan State, villages that were impacted by the recent flood but are lesser known are still in need of assistance, said Dr Than Min Htut, who went to offer aid to flood victims around the area of Inlay.

Water has still been above 10 feet in villages in Inlay, and some houses have still been underwater, he said on his Facebook page.

Most of the volunteers and donors reached villages and wards at the east of Inlay and in Nyaungshwe, but no one came to villages at the west of the lake, he said, and a woman from Pindaya was quoted as saying in his post that some families didn't eat anything for two days.

The Pyinmana Sangha Hospital team and Myanma Railways medical team went to the flood relief camp in the Nyaungwun Village Monastery in Inlay Lake on 22 September. They delivered assistance to 320 families in Nanpankyataw village and 90 families in Shan village at the west of the lake.

Moreover, relief aid was delivered to 182 families who have taken refuge

at the camp, he said. They offered relief aids totalling K17.7 million to a total of 592 families, about K30,000 per family, he said.

They set up a temporary clinic at Nyaungshwe train station and provided free medical treatments to 35 patients.

According to the follow-up report, 240 houses and 356 families, totalling 1,008 people, have still been in need of help at the Yaytha Monastery. Therefore, he urged donors to help them and provided a contact number: 09 797930864, Ko Bo Bo Tun. — MT/ZS

Confiscated illegal goods: Timbers, industrial materials, consumer goods, foodstuffs, motorbikes and vehicles

SUPERVISED by the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, action is being taken against illicit trading across the nation in accordance with the law.

During inspections on 23 and 24 September, the combined on-duty teams under the supervision of the Magway Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force nabbed illegal teak weighing 0.270 tonne, other illegal timbers weighing 0.917 tonne valued at K380,280 in Magway, Minbu and Thayet districts and three unregistered motorbikes (approximately worth K5.7 million). The action was taken under the Forest Law and the Export-Import Law.

On 24 September, the combined teams managed by the Customs Department seized three types of industrial materi-

als and three kinds of consumer goods worth about K730 million without official documents from 23 containers at the Asia World Port Terminal container checkpoint, three types of industrial materials valued at about K79 million without official documents from a container at the Thilawa Port and five kinds of industrial materials valued at K46.79 million without official documents at the Yangon International Airport (Import Desk). The action was conducted as per Customs procedures.

Similarly, on 24 September, the combined teams captured illegal teak weighing 2.113 tonnes and other timbers weighing 0.227 tonnes, approximately valued at K1.215 million in Lewe and Ottarathiri districts, 6,000 kilogrammes of ammonium nitrate worth K6 million without official

documents near Naungnang village in Myitkyina township and five unregistered vehicles (approximately worth K50 million) in Mohnyin township. The action was conducted under the Forest Law, the Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Law and the Export-Import Law.

Additionally, the combined teams impounded three vehicles (estimated value of K97 million) carrying 23 kinds of consumer goods and 13 kinds of industrial materials valued at K18.932 million without official documents near 21-mile post on Mandalay-PyinOoLwin and a Hino Profia truck (estimated value of K30 million) carrying four kinds of consumer goods valued at about K24.543 million without official documents on the outskirts of Mandalay. The action was taken in line with Customs procedures.

The combined teams supervised by the Bago Region Illegal Trade Eradication Task Force captured a Mitsubishi Canter truck (estimated value of K30 million) carrying foodstuffs valued at K6 million without official documents at the Tawwin Htun bus station in Bago highway bus compound, illegal teak weighing 19.014 tonnes worth about K8.647 million in Pyay district

and two kinds of smuggled industrial materials worth K6.9 million in Muse township. The action was taken under Customs procedures and the Forest Law.

On 25 September, the combined on-duty teams seized an unregistered Honda Fit (estimated value of K15 million) at the Kantalu combined checkpoint in Sagaing township, foodstuffs and a kind of consumer goods worth K19.5 million without official documents at the Shwe Sin Satkya Express bus station in Myeik township. The action was conducted under the Export-Import Law and Customs procedures.

The Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee reported 53 arrests were made on three consecutive days from 23 to 25 September, with an estimated value of K1,175 million. — MNA/MKKS

Tourist arrivals in India trail global trend, but forex earnings from tourism are up: Crisil

THE post-pandemic recovery in tourist arrivals in India is lagging the global trend. In the first half of 2024, foreign tourist arrivals into India stood at 4.78 million, about 90 per cent of that in the first half of pre-pandemic 2019, as per a Crisil report.

Research firm Crisil cited a couple of factors that are at play behind these weak tourist arrivals.

It asserted that reduced demand from Bangladesh on account of the current political scenario there and the suspension of direct flights from China are impacting tourist footfalls in India. Both these countries were a major source of tourists for India and accounted for 27 per cent of the arrivals in 2019.

Competing destinations like Qatar, Dubai, Vietnam, and Sri Lanka have surpassed their pre-COVID arrival numbers, offering more affordable options and favourable visa policies.

Besides, countries such as Qatar, Dubai, Vietnam and Sri Lanka are drawing tourists with more affordable options and favourable visa policies, Crisil said in its report. These destinations have exceeded their pre-Covid levels, with foreign tourist arrivals in Qatar up 47 per cent, Dubai 11 per cent, Vietnam four per cent and Sri Lanka 0.2 per cent in the first half of the current calendar.

"Additionally, aggressive campaigns by emerging destinations such as Azerbaijan, Georgia and Kazakhstan are competing for tourist spends," the report said.

Crisil suggested that India must simplify the visa process by expanding the e-visa and visa-on-arrival programmes, as seen in countries such as Thailand and Sri Lanka.

It also called for enhanced direct flight connectivity with markets, especially those with high tourist outflows, to further ease travel. These efforts can be amplified by leveraging social media influencers in target regions, it suggested.

On the positive side, when it comes to foreign exchange earnings, it rose 23 per cent for India in the first half of 2024 over the same period in 2019.

Germany's Deutsche Boerse targeted in EU antitrust probe

GERMAN stock market operator Deutsche Boerse confirmed Tuesday it had been raided as part of an EU investigation into possible antitrust violations involving financial derivatives.

The European Commission said Monday evening it had carried out surprise inspections at two financial services firms in connection

with the investigation, without naming the companies.

A spokesman for Deutsche Boerse told AFP the company was one of those targeted by the EU's probe, confirming earlier media reports.

Deutsche Boerse was "cooperating fully" with investigators, he said.

"We do not comment on

The other company reportedly under investigation is Nasdaq, according to the Financial Times and Bloomberg.

The European Commission said Monday it had "concerns that the inspected companies may have violated EU antitrust rules that prohibit restrictive business practices".

"The products concerned by the inspections are financial derivatives," it added.

Financial derivatives are financial contracts whose value is derived from the performance of underlying assets such as bonds, stocks or commodities.

The EU said the raids do not mean the firms are considered guilty of anti-competitive behaviour.

Unannounced investigations are a preliminary investigatory step, it said, adding there was no legal deadline to complete inquiries into anti-competitive conduct.—AFP

Defying experts, Trump vows tariff-driven US economic boom

DONALD Trump pledged Tuesday to deliver a historic windfall for the United States through a business-friendly economy that would reward companies manufacturing domestically — but heavily penalize those selling Americans foreign-made goods.

With the presidential election just six weeks away, the Republican candidate and his Democratic rival Kamala Harris are in a dead-heat race that influential pollsters have said is as close as any they have seen in years.

As the election approaches, Trump is focusing on undecided voters in battleground states, emphasizing a protectionist economic strategy to boost US manufacturing. In a recent speech in Georgia, he reiterated his proposal for significant tariffs on foreign imports, threatening 100 per cent tariffs on Mexican cars and suggesting 10-20 per cent tariffs across the board, especially on China. — AFP

ANA not to offer air taxi service at 2025 World Expo in Osaka

Despite the cancellation of commercial services, all four operators will still conduct demonstration flights at the event.

ANA Holdings Inc said Wednesday it will not offer a commercial flying taxi service at the 2025 World Exposition in Osaka, viewed as one of the highlights of the event.

Japan Airlines Co is also reconsidering its plan to provide air taxis at the expo, sources familiar with the matter said, meaning all four flying car operators that had planned commercial services at the event are unlikely to offer them.

ANA has found it difficult to obtain safety certification from authorities in time, it said. All four operators will still conduct demonstration flights, according to the companies.

Air taxis were expected to provide access to the event's venue on Yumeshima, an artificial island in Osaka Bay.

ANA has been working with Joby Aviation Inc. to operate electric vertical takeoff and landing aircraft developed by the US start-

up, while JAL is preparing to use vehicles developed by Volocopter GmbH from Germany.

The other two operators, Japan-based flying car startup SkyDrive Inc and Japanese trading house Marubeni Corp, already said they would not operate commercial flights at the expo. — Kyodo

Volkswagen crisis pits homegrown leaders against each other

VOLKSWAGEN managers and workers representatives will start crunch talks in Hanover on Wednesday, following the German group's announcement that drastic cost-cutting measures are needed to keep the carmaker competitive.

Two homegrown figures who have spent their entire careers at Volkswagen - group CEO Oliver Blume and head of the works council Daniela Cavallo — will face off at the meeting.

Blume wants to seal

this year to shore up the carmaker, which has struggled with weak demand and a difficult transition to electric vehicles.

Cavallo has promised "bitter resistance" to the plans that include the possible closure of production sites in Germany — an unprecedented step in the 87-year history of Volkswagen.

A mechanical engineer by training, Blume plotted his career through the different brands — Audi, Seat and then VW — before becoming CEO a "package" of measures of Porsche in 2015. — AFP

of only 39 official copies. In addition, the card put up for auction this time is the only one known to have been signed by Takumi Akabane, one of the three founders of the trading card game, said Sotheby's. The seller and successful bidder have not been disclosed. — Kyodo

'Monumental step' as Thai king signs same-sex marriage into law

The law, passed by parliament in June, will take effect in 120 days, with the first weddings expected to take place in January.

THE Thai king has signed samesex marriage into law, the official Royal Gazette said Tuesday, making Thailand the first country in Southeast Asia to recognize marriage equality.

King Maha Vajiralongkorn gave royal assent to the new law, passed by parliament in June, which will take effect in 120 days — meaning the first weddings are expected to take place in January.

Activists hailed a "monumental step" as Thailand becomes only the third place in Asia where same-sex couples can tie the knot, after Chinese Taipei and Nepal.

The law on marriage now uses gender-neutral terms in place of "men", "women", "husbands" and "wives", and also grants adoption and inheritance rights to same-sex couples.

The king's formal approval marks the culmination of years of campaigning and thwarted at-

tempts to pass equal marriage laws.

"The law is a monumental step towards equal rights in Thai-

land," Waaddao Chumaporn, an LGBTQ rights advocate, told AFP

She plans to organize a mass

wedding for more than a thousand LGBTQ couples in Bangkok on 22 January, the first day the law takes effect.

"We are all delighted and excited. We've been fighting for our rights for over 10 years, and now it's finally happening," Siritata Ninlapruek, an LGBTQ activist, told AFP, her voice shaking.

Prime Minister Paetongtarn Shinawatra posted congratulations "for everyone's love" on social media platform X.

"Thank you for the support from all sectors. It is a joint fight for everyone," she wrote with the "lovewins" hashtag.

Thailand has long had an international reputation for tolerance of the LGBTQ community, and opinion polls reported in local media have shown overwhelming public support for equal marriage.

However, much of the Buddhist-majority kingdom retains traditional and conservative values and LGBTQ people say they still face barriers and discrimination in everyday life. More than 30 countries around the world have legalized marriage for all since the Netherlands became the first to celebrate same-sex unions in 2001. — AFP

Israel carrying out 'extensive' strikes in Hezbollah strongholds

THE Israeli military said on Wednesday it was carrying out "extensive" air strikes in south Lebanon and the eastern Beqaa Valley after Hezbollah fired a ballistic missile that, for the first time reached the Israeli city of Tel Aviv. It was intercepted before causing any harm.

"The IDF (Israeli military) is currently conducting extensive strikes in southern Leba-

non and the Beqaa area," the military said in a statement.

It said it was striking Hezbollah targets and weapons storage facilities. It also said that some 40 projectiles had crossed into northern Israel from Lebanon, setting off warning sirens in the area. "Several projectiles were intercepted," the military said.

"The Hezbollah terrorist organization continues to launch projectiles towards civilian areas and facilities on the Israeli home front."

Hezbollah said its ballistic missile targeted Israeli spy agency Mossad's headquarters near Tel Aviv because recent attacks on the militant group had been planned there. — AFP

China calls for joint efforts to advance global governance

CHINESE Foreign Minister Wang Yi on Monday called on the international community to "take good care of our common home" and make joint efforts to advance global governance, as "humanity has only one planet Earth to call home, and we belong to the same world community".

Facing profound changes unseen in a century, it was highly relevant that world leaders gathered at the Summit of the Future and, together, adopted the Pact for the Future to galvanize their collective efforts for world peace and development, and to map out the future of humanity, said Wang, who is also special representative of Chinese President Xi Jinping and a member of the Political Bureau of the Communist Party of China Central Committee, in his statement at the summit.

Wang noted that with this goal in mind, Xi has put forward the vision of building a community with a shared future for mankind, advocated high-quality Belt and Road cooperation, and proposed the Global Development Initiative, the Global Security Initiative and the Global Civilization Initiative. — Xinhua

Madrid's Mbappe suffers thigh injury before Atletico derby

REAL Madrid striker Kylian Mbappe has sustained a thigh injury ahead of this weekend's La Liga derby with Atletico, his club said on Wednesday.

The French superstar was taken off during the 3-2 win over Alaves on Tuesday and appeared to be suffering some discomfort.

Spanish media suggest Mbappe will miss around three weeks injured.

"Following tests carried out today by Real Madrid's medical services on our player Kylian Mbappe, he has been diagnosed with an injury to the biceps femoris in his left leg," said the Spanish champions in a statement.

Mbappe scored a superb goal in the thriller at the Santiago Bernabeu with Alaves and has netted five times this season in seven league appearances.

Asked about Mbappe's condition after the game, Real Madrid coach Carlo Ancelotti said: "He's fine, he's fine, a little overloaded, he asked me for the change to avoid problems." Madrid, a point behind leaders Barcelona ahead of the Catalans' match on Wednesday against Getafe, visit the Metropolitano stadium on Sunday to face rivals Atletico. — AFP

MYANMAR'S national team striker, Aung Thu, will miss upcoming friendly matches, including the fixture against Uthai Thani FC, due to recovery from knee surgery. Aung Thu, who has been dealing with a lingering knee injury, reportedly underwent surgery on 24 September.

The striker, along with Aung Kaung Mahn, was initially not included in the national team's preliminary squad for international friendlies. Aung Thu had previously planned surgery during his time with Lamphun Warriors, but due to various reasons, the procedure was delayed until now.

Following the surgery, his wife, actress Poe Ei Ei Khant, expressed her support, saying, "Wishing my strong and determined husband a speedy recovery from knee surgery. Your strength on and off the field inspires me every day. You've got this!" She added,

"A leg that fought hard for our family, now deserving of rest and care".

Aung Thu is expected to need three to six weeks of recovery before he can return to full training. The Uthai Thani FC has confirmed that he will rejoin the team once he is fully fit. — Htun Htun/KZL

Shan United faces defeat in AFC Champions League group stage

IN the opening match of the 2024-2025 AFC Champions League group stage, Myanmar's Shan United suffered a 4-3 defeat against Indonesia's Makassar at an away venue.

Having previously lost to Vietnam's Thanh Hoa in their opening match, Shan United aimed to secure points in this game. However, despite their efforts, they conceded a late goal that sealed their fate as the final whistle approached.

In the squad, Shan United featured only one foreign player, striker Rintaro, alongside local players. The team managed to score three goals in the latter part of the match, but a late goal from Makassar led to their loss. Makassar's goals came from Nammin in 33 minutes, Neto in 36 minutes, Faul in 49 minutes, and Rahaman in the 90+2 minute. Shan United's goals were scored by Rintaro in the 45+2 minute, Machaki in 56 minutes, and Barkayo in 67 minutes.

World Cup winner Varane retires

FRANCE World Cup winner Raphael Varane on Wednesday announced his retirement from football at the age of 31, adding that he will remain at Como in a non-playing capacity.

Former Real Madrid and Manchester United centre-back Varane had joined the Italian club for this season but was then excluded from their Serie A squad having suffered a knee injury in August.

"A new life begins off the pitch," Varane said on social media.

"I will remain with Como. Just without using my boots and shin pads.

"Something I am looking forward to sharing more about soon," the four-time Champions League winner added.

Varane came through the academy at French club Lens before join-

ing Madrid as an 18-year-old in 2011.

He claimed the first of his three La Liga titles in his maiden season in his first season in the Spanish capital.

In 2014 he secured the first of his four Champions League crowns with a league and European double three years later.

Varane joined United in 2024, lifting a League Cup and an FA Cup with the English club. — AFP

BRICS civilization dialogue deepens understanding, friendship: organizers

Last year, Cambodia welcomed nearly 5.5 million visitors, generating over \$3 billion in revenue, though still below pre-pandemic levels. — Xinhua

PLA launches intercontinental ballistic missile to high seas

THE Chinese People's Liberation Army (PLA) Rocket Force launched an intercontinental ballistic missile carrying a dummy warhead into the high seas in the Pacific Ocean on Wednesday morning, according to the Ministry of National Defence.

The missile fell into expected sea areas, the ministry said, adding that this was a routine arrangement in the annual training plan and relevant countries had been notified in advance.

The launch tested weaponry performance and military training effectiveness and achieved desired goals, the ministry noted. — Xinhua
