At the meeting, they frankly discussed the prevention of illegal border trade, demolishing the buildings by Myanmar in KK Park and Shwe Kokko

areas, where online gambling activities are taking place in the border areas, and national-level efforts to combat illegal sales of arms and ammunition at the border areas of both countries.

# 2025 MULTIPARTY DEMOCRACY GENERAL ELECTION

- Domestic election observers who wish to monitor the multiparty democratic general election, which will begin in phases on 28 December 2025, may apply for election observation permits at the Union Election Commission (UEC), as well as the relevant Region/State, District, and Township Election Subcommissions from today until 5 December 2025.
- The Union Election Commission announced on 16 September 2025 that domestic election observers must follow the Code of Conduct for Observers, issued under Notification 68/2025, and adhere to the procedures set out for their observation activities under Notification 69/2025. These notifications are available for viewing and can be downloaded from the Union Election Commission's official website https://www.uec.gov.mm.
- The Union Election Commission has also announced that international election observers will be allowed to monitor the multiparty democratic general election. Invitations will be extended directly to representatives of relevant countries and international organizations. In addition, through the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, invitations will be sent to representatives of foreign embassies, consulates, and permanent missions that maintain diplomatic relations with the Government of the Republic of the Union of Myanmar.



They checked the rear lawn area and a section of ground that has subsided and instructed priority repairs. They also directed the replacement of only the damaged sections of the flooring, pillars, walls, window frames and roofs inside the building, together with other necessary arrangements. — MNA/KZL

YANGON Region has begun selecting contestants to represent the region in the upcoming Mr & Miss Culture Myanmar competition, according to The Model of Myanmar Model Agency, which is responsible for organizing the event.

Alinn Khit, National Director of The Model of Myanmar Model Agency, said the agency is now inviting applicants who will later compete in the Mr & Miss Culture International event. He explained that the competition

is held annually and that the agency is currently recruiting contestants for its third edition. He added that the aim is to give Myanmar's undiscovered talents the opportunity to appear on the international stage while also promoting the country's traditional culture and heritage.

Contestants must follow the competition's rules and guidelines. Those without prior experience will be offered free basic training in catwalk skills and other essential knowledge, and shortlisted candidates must be able to commit sufficient time for further training.

Applicants must be between 16 and 28 years of age. Male applicants must be at least five feet five inches tall, and female applicants at least five feet two inches tall. They must have completed at least the high-school level, possess a well-proportioned physique, demonstrate good interpersonal skills and be able to comply with the agency's rules. Applicants currently under contract with other agencies are not eligible. — ASH/KZL

# Myanmar delivers humanitarian aid to cyclone-hit Sri Lanka

THE government and people of Myanmar delivered urgent humanitarian aid to Sri Lankan communities affected by Cyclone Ditwah. On 28 November 2025, the cyclone caused flooding and landslides across 25 districts, affecting over 900,000 people and damaging homes, roads, and essential infrastructure.

Following the guidance from Myanmar's Head of State, a delegation led by Director-General U Zaw Phyo Win of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs and Director-General Daw Lei Lei Aye of Ministry of Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement flew to Colombo on the night of 6 December. They were welcomed by Myanmar Ambassador to Sri Lanka Daw Marlar Than Htaik and senior Sri Lankan officials, including Chanmari Rodrigo of Southeast and Central Asia Affairs and Air Vice Marshal S Deshapriya GM Silva.

The Myanmar team hand-

ed over medicines, medical supplies, and personal health items carried by the military aircraft, totalling 9.2 tonnes, to support recovery efforts. This aid, valued at around US\$120,000, includes 500 tonnes of rice and an extra US\$100,000 in relief funds to be delivered in the coming days. The gesture reflects strong bilateral relations and Myanmar's commitment to assisting Sri Lanka in rebuilding swiftly. — MNA/KZL

A workshop on developing construction project management skills for high-rise and public building projects is being held in Yangon from 5 to 12 December, according to the High-Rise and Public Building Project Committee (HPBC).

The workshop, titled "Management System for Building a Better Future Together", is being held at the Department of Urban and Housing Development in Botahtaung Township, Yangon Region. Project directors, project managers, and civil engineers supervising construction work on high-rise projects in the Yangon Region are attending the discussion.

"Construction project management is crucial for the con-




This photo showcases a workshop on developing construction project management skills for high-rise and public building projects, held in Yangon from 5 to 12 December.

struction of high-rise and public buildings, which involve significant risks. Therefore, we are organizing these workshops to help those in the relevant sectors gain more knowledge on the subject and further develop their skills," said HPBC Chairman U Thein Zaw.

Four construction experts discussed issues related to the Myanmar National Building Code 2025 during the workshop. The code was initially drafted in 2008 by experts from the Federation of Myanmar Engineering Societies with international assistance and was put into use in 2020. Five years later, the upgraded Myanmar National Building Code 2025 was published. — ASH/TH

### Over 150 booths exhibited at 2025 Myanmar International Textile and Machinery Fair in Yangon

ACCORDING to the Myanmar Garment Manufacturers Association (MGMA), more than 150 booths from Myanmar, China, Hong Kong SAR, Korea and ASEAN countries were showcased at the 2025 Myanmar International Textile and Machinery Fair.

The fair was held from 5

to 7 December at the Yangon Convention Centre, Inya Lake Hotel, Mayangon Township, Yangon Region, with the aim of promoting small and medium-sized garment enterprises and facilitating their connection to international markets.

The event was jointly organized by the Myanmar Gar-

ment Manufacturers Association (MGMA) and the Chinese Textile & Garment Association (CTGA), with the support of the Department of Commerce of Zhejiang Province, China.

More than 110 booths from over 70 Chinese companies and around 40 booths from Myanmar took part in the fair, bringing the total to over 150 booths. Textile and machinery products from member factories of MGMA, as well as from Korea (KOGAM), Hong Kong (HKMMA) and ASEAN countries, were exhibited.

Alongside the main fair, an electrical goods exhibition, a car show, and a Thai product fair were also held from 5 to 7 December, running daily from 9 am to 5 pm for three consecutive days. — ASH/KNN

# MRF, MRPTA supply rice via home delivery system

THE 108-pound rice sacks, as well as 10-kilogramme bags of Shwebo Pawsan, Ayeyawady Pawsan, and Aemahta rice can be ordered through the home delivery system by contacting the Myanmar Rice Federation (MRF) and the Myanmar Rice and Paddy Traders Association (MRPTA).

> Xi also highlighted five principles of the GGI — adhering to sovereign equality, abiding by international rule of law, practising multilateralism, advocating the people-centred approach, and focusing on taking real actions. While the historical trends of peace, development, cooperation and mutual benefit remain unchanged, the Cold War mentality, hegemonism and protectionism continue to haunt the world, Xi said, adding that new threats and

challenges have been only increasing, and the world has found itself in a new period of turbulence and transformation. "Global governance has come to a new crossroads," he said.

marked the 80<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the victory in the World Anti-Fascist War and the 80th founding anniversary of the United Nations (UN). # The Subtle Magic of Gentle Words

HAVE a small, heartfelt wish. In our journey through life, may we never have to face people who are extremely difficult to get along with. And even more importantly, may we never become one of those difficult people ourselves. That is my simple prayer - quiet, sincere, and deeply meaningful. Because the way we treat others, and the way we allow others to treat us, shapes our daily happiness far more than we often realize. Even the smallest interactions can lift us or drain us, and sometimes the tone of a single conversation can affect the rest of our day.

Many of us have known someone impossible to talk to — someone who refuses to compromise, who chooses conflict over peace, who never sees their own faults but can list every weakness in others with surprising accuracy. We have all felt the discomfort of dealing with a person who forgets kindness quickly, gets angry easily, and cannot forgive try — imperfectly, but truly — to stay aware of around us, when we cannot get along with

even the tiniest mistake. Their presence feels heavy, almost as if a dark cloud follows them into every space they enter.

When we interact with such people, our own thoughts begin to twist and tighten. Even a simple conversation feels like walking on a narrow edge, where one wrong word might trigger an explosion. The mind becomes suffocated, turning in circles, trying to find a gentle path through a landscape of misunderstanding. Words like understanding, adjustment, patience, and cooperation simply do not exist in their world. Everything becomes a struggle, even when it should be effortless.

Because of this, we naturally wish to avoid people who make life harder. But that wish comes with a responsibility. While we hope not to meet such individuals, we must also hope never to become one ourselves. The world already has enough tension, pride, and miscommunication. If our own behaviour adds more difficulty, we simply add more unhappiness to the world around us. So we

That awareness begins with gentle, honest reflection. If we start to see that we struggle to get along with many people, if we often feel suspicious, misunderstood, or attacked, if we begin to believe that everyone else is the problem and if people quietly step back when we enter a room, then perhaps there is something within us that needs care and understanding. Realizing this can feel uncomfortable, sometimes even painful, but it is also deeply important. It is the first, quiet step toward real growth.

There is a simple story that illustrates this very beautifully. A man once walked around complaining about a terrible smell. He blamed the air, the surroundings, the weather, and even the people near him. Much later, he discovered that the smell came from a piece of dried fish stuck in his own beard. In life, this happens more often than we expect. When we constantly complain about everyone

battle, the issue may not lie outside. It may be something we are carrying within ourselves.

Difficult people often cannot tolerate even a single wrong word. They insist on being right every time. They believe they never make mistakes. Their stories always begin with how other people have treated them badly. In their eyes, blame always travels outward. Apologizing feels impossible. Compromise feels like losing. Understanding feels unnecessary.

But relationships built on pride, stubbornness, and blame rarely lead to happiness. They lead to distance. People slowly begin to avoid those who refuse to be gentle or flexible. They step back — not because they are cruel, but because peace becomes impossible when conflict follows someone everywhere they go. And no matter how lonely the difficult person begins to feel, they may still not understand that their own harshness is the cause of that

# Tatmadaw vessel Thanlwin completes coastal healthcare mission

TATMADAW vessel Thanlwin returned after providing healthcare services to local people in Yangon and Ayeyawady regions.

The Tatmadaw's special medical team includes doctors, surgeons, and nurses, aboard the Tatmadaw Vessel Thanlwin which have completed a healthcare mission

for local people in towns, villages and surrounding areas in Yangon Region's Cocokyun Township and Ayeyawady Region's Hainggyikyun Town.

The medical team carried out healthcare services from 18 November to 6 December. The vessel arrived back in Yangon yesterday, docking at the No 2 Naval Jetty (Thilawa), where they were welcomed by Tatmadaw members and families from Thanlyin Station.

The medical team on board the Thanlwin vessel provided services the surrounding areas in Yangon Region's Cocokyun Township and surrounding villages of Hainggyikyun, Ngaputaw Township, Ayeyawady Region.

Throughout this mission, the team treated a total of 6,836 people including 1,831 with general diseases, 697 surgical patients, 230 obstetric patients, 383 paediatric patients, 1,092 orthopaedic patients, 400 ENT patients, 1,295 ophthalmology patients and 944 dental patients. Among them, 88 underwent surgeries for general conditions and 145 received eye surgeries on board the vessel.

In turn, 160 patients received X-ray tests, 832 were examined using ultrasound, 634 underwent ECG heart tests and 466 had laboratory tests. The medical team also successfully assisted in the delivery of five pregnant women, while three individuals were referred to local Tatmadaw and people's hospitals for further treatment.

This mission marks its 19<sup>th</sup> trip, during which 170,484 people received healthcare services. During these missions, the team has also helped deliver 27 babies safely.

On the other hand, people who approach life with gentleness create a quiet warmth wherever they go. Those who forgive easily, who listen carefully, who try to understand another person's heart, who are not ashamed to apologize when they are wrong — these individuals bring a sense of safety. Being around them feels relaxing. Conversations become easier. Even disagreements become manageable because respect remains at the centre. Their presence turns ordinary moments into peaceful

Living this way requires

softness, but it is not a softness that weakens us. It is a strength that refuses to rely on anger or pride. It is a strength that says, "I value peace more than winning." It says, "I care more about the relationship than about proving myself right."

This gentle strength is quiet, but it is powerful. It often speaks louder than raised voices ever could.

People who are too difficult in relationships rarely find lasting joy. They unknowingly build a cold, narrow box around themselves. They close their own hearts without realizing it. And while they may believe everyone else is the problem, the truth is simple: happiness cannot survive in a place where understanding, patience, and kindness do not exist.

Life is not as long as we imagine. Time moves quietly, and every moment we spend in unnecessary conflict is a moment of peace we lose forever. Just as we deserve happiness, the people around us deserve it too. When others feel anxious, small, or hurt because of our behaviour, it shows that compassion has stepped aside. And once compassion disappears, relationships begin to crumble.

That is why we remind ourselves to soften. To speak gently even when we feel frustrated. To listen even when we disagree. To understand, even when it takes effort. To forgive — not because the past can change, but because our heart needs room to breathe. We practice gratitude for even the smallest things. And when we make mistakes — and we all will — we try not to let pride silence our apology.

Let us not become people who are too difficult to deal with. Let us not be the reason someone else feels afraid, stressed, or unwelcome. Instead, let us be the kind of people whose presence brings comfort and steadiness. Let us be people who carry calmness into stressful moments and kindness into uncomfortable ones.

A gentle way of relating to the world has the power to

transform not only our own lives, but also the lives of the people around us. A soft voice can calm a storm. A sincere apology can mend a broken connection. A moment of understanding can stop a cycle of conflict that might have continued for years.

We cannot control everything that happens, but we can control how we respond. We can control the kind of person we choose to become. And if we choose gentleness — if we choose understanding, patience, and humility – we create a circle of peace around us. Life becomes lighter. Relationships grow stronger. Happiness becomes easier to reach. And that, perhaps, is one of the most meaningful gifts we can offer — to ourselves, and to the world we move through each day.

# 12 more buildings used in telecom fraud and online gambling demolished in KK Park area

THE government of Myanmar manages the combined team comprising security forces, administative bodies and local authorities to raid illegal buildigs in Shwe Kokko and KK Park areas where telecom fraud and online gambling activities are operated, and systematically dismantle the confiscated materials and illegal buildings used in the online scams and gambling activities.

Yesterday, the combined team dissolved 12 more illegal buildings — two four-storey buildings and 10 two-storey buildings used in telecom fraud and online gambling activities in Myawady-Maethawtalay (KK Park) area. Hence, a total of 333 buildings out of 635 illegal buildings have been so far demolished in KK Park area.

Likewise, the similar operation was conducted in Shwe

Kokko area, starting from 18 November. Up to now, a total of 169 buildings used in the telecom fraud and online gambling activities out of 694 buildings have been inspected. Authorities of the combined team have sealed 161 buildings not to be

Not to reuse the materials in the online scams and gambling activities in KK Park and Shwe Kokko areas, the seized materials were incinerated systematically. Moreover, the Illegal Foreigner Investigation Team verified the foreign nationals detained in the above areas. The relevant departmental combined teams are carrying out the necessary processes, including collecting personal data and recording required documentation to enable their prompt repatriation to their respective countries

### Three-day illegal trade crackdown seizes various goods

UNDER the supervision of the Illegal Trade Eradication Steering Committee, efforts to combat the illicit trade are continued effectively by the law.

On 1 and 2 December, the combined teams impounded two unregistered vehicles worth K16 million in Kalay township, illegal timbers worth K651,840 in DaikU and Kyaukdaga townships, an unregistered vehicle worth K8 million at the Ayeyawady Bridge combined checkpoint in Magway township, a mobile phone with currency notes worth K163,400, which is used for gambling in Aunglan township and an unregistered vehicle and an unregistered motorbike valued at K12 million in Ye and Bilin townships. The action was conducted under the Forest

Law, the Gambling Law and the Export/Import Law.

Additionally, on the same day, the joint on-duty teams confiscated the electronics and industrial materials worth K87.471 million without official documents from two containers at the Thilawa Port, consumer goods worth K33.05 million without official documents from a passenger's luggage at the Yangon International Airport and industrial materials valued at K3.329 million without official documents at the Yangon International Airport (Warehouse). The action was taken per Customs procedures.

The Steering Committee reported 12 seizures on 1 and 2 December, seizing illegal goods worth approximately K160 mil-







Also, on 30 November and 2 and 3 December, the combined teams seized foodstuffs, consumer goods valued at K3.9 million without official documents at the Yadanabon Bridge combined checkpoint, two unregistered motorbikes worth K2 million in Shwebo and Kalay townships, illegal teak and other timbers worth K8.144 million

in Ottwin Township, an unregistered vehicle worth K7 million in Waw Township, illegal diesel worth K714,850 at the Yadanabon Bridge (Hnapauk) checkpoint in Mandalay, illegal timbers valued at K102,000 in Ngaputaw and Thaboung townships, an unregistered motorbike valued at K400,000 in Hinthada Township and industrial materials worth K5.171 million without official documents from a container at the Asia World Port. The action was taken under the Petroleum and Petroleum Products Law, the Forest Law, the Export/Import Law, and Customs procedures.

The Steering Committee reported 11 seizures worth K27.43 million on 30 November and 2 and 3 December. — MNA/

### Vietnamese PM orders all-out efforts to accelerate public investment disbursement

Faster public investment disbursement is seen as a key strategy to fully utilize public investment to bolster macroeconomic stability.

VIETNAMESE Prime Minister Pham Minh Chinh issued an official dispatch urging faster disbursement of public investment before year-end, the Vietnam News Agency reported Sunday.

The document underscored the government's push to sustain economic momentum, maintain macroeconomic stability, and create jobs.

Finance Ministry data showed that 553.25 trillion Vietnamese dong (about US\$21.99 billion) had been disbursed from January to November, accounting for only 60.6 per cent of the prime minister's annual target. The prime minister ordered relevant departments to take drastic measures and to fully utilize public investment to bolster macroeconomic stability. — Xinhua

### Mongolia launches 2025 livestock census

MONGOLIA has launched its nationwide 2025 livestock census, the country's National Statistical Office (NSO) said Sunday.

The census data collected

between 7-17 December will be used to evaluate the activities of the livestock sector and make macro-level estimates, the NSO said in a statement.

The sector of animal husbandry is one of the main pillars of the Mongolian economy, and almost 40 per cent of the country's nomadic population depends on it.

However, due to the harsh and long winter, most of Mongolia's nomadic herders lose livestock every year, which leads to a reduction in their livelihoods.

According to the NSO, Mongolia had 57.6 million heads of livestock at the end of 2024.

#### Hungarian premier announces large business delegation visit to Russia

A large Hungarian delegation will visit Moscow in the coming days to discuss economic issues and cooperation strategies after sanctions are lifted, Hungarian Prime Minister Viktor Orban announced on Saturday.

"A huge business delegation is heading to Moscow in the coming days, in early December, to discuss exclusively economic issues," Orban said at an event in the Hungarian city of Kecskemet, broadcast by the M1 television channel.

Orban said that Hungary is negotiating with Russia on how economic cooperation between the two countries will be structured "after this entire sanctions system ends, because it cannot remain like this forever." – SPUTNIK

# Export Promotion Mission sets unified path to strengthen India's export competitiveness

INDIA took a major step to strengthen its export ecosystem with the launch of the Export Promotion Mission (EPM), a unified framework approved in the Union Budget 2025-26. The Mission was designed to provide Indian exporters, especially MSMEs and first-time exporters, with simpler, faster, and more coordinated support.

As per data from a government release, with an outlay of Rs 25,060 crore for FY 2025-26 to FY 2030-31, the Mission aims to improve trade finance, strengthen market readiness and build competitiveness across regions and sectors. EPM brings together several fragmented schemes

into one system so exporters can access support in a clear and predictable manner.

The policy rationale behind EPM is rooted in the need for a more coordinated export-support structure. India already has programmes such as interest equalisation and market-access initiatives, but official assessments show that challenges remain in access to affordable finance, meeting international quality standards, coordinated branding and easing logistics gaps. Recent export trends also point to the need for stronger digital systems and a single mechanism that can respond quickly to global trade changes. - ANI

### Japan's 1st bus service with lie-flat seats begins

JAPAN'S first overnight bus service with lie-flat seats began Saturday in western Japan, allowing passengers to relax during the roughly 10-hour trip to and from Tokyo as the operator aims to make the service a "new form of mobility". Bus operator Kochi Ekimae Kanko, based in Kochi Prefecture, decided to launch the service in the hope of catering to the needs of bus travellers who complain that overnight bus rides are

physically exhausting.

The seats can be converted into two tiers of beds. The bus departs from Kochi on Saturday night, and leaves Tokyo on Sunday night, with one stop in the city of Naruto in Tokushima Prefecture, which neighbours Kochi.

Fares depend on the availability of seats, with a lower bed seat costing around 10,000 yen (\$64) one way, while an upper bed seat costs 12,000 or more. — Kyodo

# Cambodia's pilot visa-free policy for Chinese visitors expected to boost tourism: official

CAMBODIA'S pilot visa-free policy will lure more Chinese tourists to the Southeast Asian country and boost local tourism, Cambodian Minister of Tourism Huot Hak said here on Saturday.

The government on Tuesday approved the pilot program of visa exemption for Chinese nationals traveling from China.

This exemption allows a 14-day stay during a fourmonth period from 15 June to 15 October 2026. They will not be required to pay any fees and will only need to complete an electronic arrival card. Multiple entries will be permitted during the trial period.

"The government's decision marks a historic milestone in the development of the Cambodia-China tourism sector," Hak

said in a speech at a Cambodia-China music and cultural show in the cultural province of Siem Reap.

"It will pave the way for comprehensive coop-

eration between the two countries, and will definitely attract more Chinese tourists to Cambodia," he added. The minister said the move will give a

boost to the development of Cambodia's tourism industry, which is one of the major pillars supporting the country's economy. — Xinhu

### Musk slams EU over fine on social media X

US tech billionaire Elon Musk on Saturday blasted the European Union (EU) for a fine slapped on his social media platform X for violating transparency rules, warning that his response would target the officials

responsible for the penalty.

"The 'EU' imposed this crazy fine not just on (X), but also on me personally, which is even more insane!" the Tesla CEO wrote on X. "Therefore, it would seem appropriate to apply

our response not just to the EU, but also to the individuals who took this action against me."

He followed up with another post, saying, "The EU should be abolished."

The EU's decision

has already drawn sharp rebukes from US officials, who depicted the fine as an assault on broader free speech rights and claimed US companies are being unfairly targeted, local media reported. — Xinhua

Athletes from relevant sports teams representing Myanmar depart one after another for Thailand to take part in the XXXIII SEA Games, starting from 30 November. Yesterday morning, athletes of Sepak Takraw, Chinlone (Caneball), equestrian, gymnastics and rowing teams left for Thailand.

In elevating the nation's prestige, the sports sector plays an important role. As citizens, individuals and teams alike have contributed to honouring the nation across generations. Today, young people continue to uphold this tradition by serving the country and its people through the fields in which they excel, and among them, selected athletes stand at the forefront. During major competitions such as the SEA Games, the public eagerly follows and supports the events across the different sports categories. As athletes return home carrying gold medals that bring pride and honour to the nation, people are prepared to warmly and joyfully welcome them back.

The national teams representing Myanmar in Sepak Takraw, Chinlone, equestrian, gymnastics, and rowing departed the Yangon International Airport yesterday morning for Bangkok, Chiang Mai, and Chonburi of Thailand to compete in the SEA Games. At the XXXII SEA Games, the women's team also won a medal, and for this year's SEA Games, we expect to win gold in the mixed quadrant event for both men and women. As support for Chinlone continues to grow in Myanmar, our team is determined to give our utmost to win a gold medal. We respectfully request all the people of Myanmar to support us in the competition.

For the SEA Games, 12 men and 12 women were selected in February and

placed in training camp. From these, the final squad of eight men and eight women was chosen for the competition. We will be competing in two events — Men's and Women's Event-3 — and our main opponent is the host country. The traditional Chinlone events will begin on 9 December for both the men's and women's teams, and the final matches will take place on 10 December. Since only two events are being contested in this SEA Games, we are aiming for gold.

At the XXXII SEA Games, we won four gold medals, three silver medals, and one bronze medal. Therefore, we ask all Myanmar people, both at home and abroad, to support Myanmar's trathe rider and the horse to compete together. Our competitions will take place on 13, 17, and 19 December. Equestrian events are difficult to predict compared to other sports, but we will compete at our best. At the XXXII SEA Games, we won silver and bronze medals, and for this SEA Games, we will strive to win a gold medal for the country. Many people in Myanmar love and value equestrian sports as part of our traditional heritage, so we would like to ask everyone to give their full support to our team.

for a full year both domestically and abroad. At the SEA Games, one male and two female athletes will compete in MAG and WAG gymnastics events. Although we did not participate in the XXXII SEA Games, we have competed in other tournaments and won medals. The competition will take place from 10 to 12 December, with athletes from seven ASEAN countries participating. We have prepared and trained to our fullest, and as national athletes, we aim to return with medals, serving as role models and inspiration for the next generation of young athletes.

For the SEA Games, athletes from regions and states were trained for over a year. In the competition, seven athletes — three men and six women — will participate in seven different events. The team also includes one administrator and three coaches. In previous competitions in the Philippines and Vietnam, the team has won bronze medals. In this SEA Games, the men will compete in one singles rowing event and a doubles rowing event, along with another event, while the women will compete in one singles rowing event and a four-person rowing event, totalling seven events overall.

Since we trained intensively in comparison with the standards at the competition in Vietnam, we expect the women's four oar rowing team to win gold. With strong competitors from five other countries, we will give our best effort. The competition will run from 14 to 17 December, with an additional event on 19 December. Arriving early allows the team to acclimate to the water and wind conditions of the host country, giving them an advantage in the competition. The people of Myanmar are eagerly awaiting encouraging messages to inspire our international rowing athletes representing the country at the SEA Games. We aim to return with gold medals that will enhance the nation's prestige. — Translated.

# Indonesia beat Singapore in SEA Games women's football

THE second day of Group A in the SEA Games women's football tournament continued in Chonburi on 7 December, where Indonesia claimed a 3-1 victory over Singapore.

Group A features only three teams, and host Thailand have almost secured top position after winning their opening match. That left the Indonesia–Singapore fixture effectively as the decisive contest for the remaining semi-final place. Indonesia strengthened their qualification chances with this win, while Singapore, who still have Thailand left to play, are now virtually out of contention for a place in the next round.

Singapore opened the scoring in the  $22^{nd}$  minute through Fannah Neth, who finished a quick move to give her side an early lead. Indonesia responded nine minutes later when Iza levelled the match in the  $31^{st}$  minute, sending the teams into the break with one goal each.

Indonesia controlled the second half with stronger pressing and more decisive attacking play. Kaludia gave Indonesia the lead in the 63<sup>rd</sup> minute after a well-worked attacking sequence. The match moved towards its conclusion with Singapore struggling to regain rhythm, and Indonesia sealed the result in the 90+5 minute of added time when Ulia scored their third goal to secure all three points.

In Group A, Thailand lead with three points from one match, while Indonesia also hold three points from two matches played. Singapore have yet to earn a point after one match. The final group fixture, Thailand ver-

# New US National Security Strategy recognizes Russia, China and US as World's Great Powers: Expert

HE document's dismissal of Europe "as a power of no significance signals that there are three truly great powers left: the United States, Russia and China," military expert Alexei Borzenko told Sputnik.


The US is also "well aware that we've outpaced them on certain types of weapons," the observer said, citing Russian advances in hypersonics, and the depletion of US and European weapon stocks in Ukraine.

The US is eager to end the crisis in Ukraine, which has proven "a deadend situation" for NATO "from which the only way out is peace," Borzenko said, citing the document's conciliatory language on the conflict and on Russia.

Furthermore, "during negotiations, the Americans figured out what the Kiev junta represents, and how difficult it is to negotiate with it. They understand what kind of crooks they are dealing with" and are tired of it, Borzenko argues.

That's why various leaders' recent claims that the Ukrainian crisis could end abruptly seems like a real possibility, according to the analyst. "If this happens, everything will become completely different in an instant," Borzenko summed up. — SPUTNIK

# New China-Vietnam air route boosts links with ASEAN

COLOURFUL Guizhou Airlines has launched a direct route linking Guiyang, capital of southwest China's Guizhou Province, with Ho Chi Minh City in Vietnam, further ex-

panding China's air links with fast-growing ASEAN markets amid rising regional travel and trade

The service began on Saturday, the Guizhou civil aviation

group said. According to the route schedule, outbound flight GY703 will depart from Guiyang at 10:50 pm Beijing Time and land in Ho Chi Minh City at 1:30 am local time. Return flight GY704 will take off at 2:30 am local time and arrive in Guiyang at 7:10 am Beijing Time.

This new route will operate alongside the carrier's existing Guiyang-Hanoi service, thereby ensuring direct connections between this mountainous province and Vietnam's two biggest cities.

Officials said the expanded network is expected to support trade, tourism and business travel between southwest China and ASEAN.

China-ASEAN air connectivity has been accelerating in recent months. — Xinhua

# Seawater transfer project launched for industrial use in C Iran

IRANIAN President Masoud Pezeshkian inaugurated a major pipeline project on Saturday to transport desalinated seawater from the Gulf of Oman to Isfahan province in central Iran, aiming to alleviate water shortages in local industries.

According to a statement by Pezeshkian's office, the 800-km pipeline project was implemented with an investment of US\$291.6 million over two years, with significant support from Isfahan-based privately owned Mobarakeh Steel Company.

The project, completed in early July, is expected to

reduce reliance on the Zayandehrud, a famed, once-flourishing river running through central Iran, which has become largely dry.

Speaking at the inauguration ceremony, Pezeshkian voiced confidence in solving the country's water stress, noting that industrial development should shift toward southern coastal regions with direct sea access. According to a 2023 report by the World Resources Institute, a global research non-profit organization, Iran was among the 25 countries being "exposed to extremely high water stress annually". — Xinhua
