BAY INFERENCE: According to the observations at 5:30 pm MST today, the low pressure area over Westcentral and adjoining Northwest Bay of Bengal (off North Andhra Pradesh and South Odisha coasts, India) still persists. It is likely to move west-northwestwards and further intensify into a Well-Marked Low-Pressure Area during next 24 hours. Monsoon is moderate to strong over the Andaman Sea and Bay of Bengal.

FORECAST VALID UNTIL NOON OF 14 August 2025: Rain or thundershowers will be scattered in Magway Region and Kayah State, fairly widespread in Nay Pyi Taw, Mandalay, Bago, and lower Sagaing regions and Rakhine State and widespread in the remaining Regions and States with likelihood of isolated heavy falls in upper Sagaing, and Taninthayi regions and Kachin, and northern Shan states. Degree of certainty is 100 per cent. THE CONDITION OF CUMULONIMBUS CLOUD: The cumulonimbus clouds are developing in Mandalay, upper Sagaing, Ayeyawady Region and Kachin, Rakhine, and northern Shan states. The area along the cumulonimbus clouds movement, the weather phenomena such as strong winds accompanied with rain, thunder, lightning and hail may occur and therefore it is recommended to be aware in advance of these phenomena. **STATE OF THE SEA:** Squalls with moderate to rough seas are likely at times off and along the Myanmar Coasts. Surface wind speed in squalls may reach 25-30 miles per hour. Wave height will be about 8-10 feet off and along the Myanmar Coasts. 



Residents Urged to Prioritize Public Safety Amid Armed Terrorist Threats

ARMED terrorists have been launching attacks by using residential homes and administrative buildings in towns and villages as cover, where they have forcibly settled. They aim to shield themselves from Tatmadaw counterattacks while also persuading temporarily displaced persons to return to their native areas and recruiting new members. That enables terrorists to use civilians as human shields. Tatmadaw is committed to safeguarding the sovereignty of the State and will respond to these threats based on intelligence and prevailing conditions. Therefore, residents in areas where terrorists have taken control must prioritize their safety and protect themselves from being exploited by these groups.

Central Committee on Security Supervision meets ahead of general election

THE first meeting of the Central Committee on Security Supervision during the Multiparty Democracy General Election took place yesterday afternoon at the Areindama Hall of the Myanmar Police Force Headquarters.

The meeting was attended by the Chairman of the Central Committee on Security Supervision, Union Minister for Home Affairs Lt-Gen Tun Tun Naung, along with Vice-Chairpersons, Central Committee members, a representative from the Union Election Commission, the Chairman and members of the Nay Pyi Taw Union Territory Committee on Security Supervision, and officials from the Myanmar Police Force Headquarters. Meanwhile, the chairpersons and members of the committees for security supervision from the regions and states joined via videoconference.

The Union minister first stated that preliminary coordination meetings were held with officials from the Nay Pyi Taw Union Territory, regions, and states on 14 June and 13 July to ensure the successful organization of the 2025 multiparty democracy general election.

He also noted that the Law on the Protection of Multiparty Democratic General Elections from Obstruction, Disruption and Destruction was approved and enacted on 29 July. Under this law, the Central Committee on Security Supervision was formed with 14 members, and yesterday's meeting marked its first session. He also mentioned that committees for security supervision

have been formed at various levels, including the Union Territory, regions, states, self-administered zones and divisions, district, and township levels.

The Union minister emphasized that all officials are to implement the Head of State's directives: to hold a free and fair multiparty democracy general election, to hand over state responsibilities to the newly

formed government, to ensure all eligible voters can cast their ballots, and to guarantee a secure election. He stressed the importance of paying special attention to preventing security breaches during the electoral period, as well as the need to accelerate efforts in crime reduction and the rule of law to maintain regional stability and community peace. He urged the various-level committees

on security supervision to understand their duties and powers under the law and to make special efforts in their security responsibilities, coordinating with relevant departments and partner organizations.

Following this, Deputy Chief of Police (2) Police Maj-Gen Aung Naing Thu gave a presentation on the Law on the Protection of Multiparty Democratic General Elections from Obstruction, Disruption and Destruction, which was enacted on 29 July. Subsequently, Police Brig-Gen Thet Naing, Chief of Police Staff as well as Joint Secretary of the Central Committee, presented the proposed security arrangements for the general election period.

Afterwards, the chairpersons of the committees on security supervision from the regions and states presented their respective security plans. Central Committee members and the representative from the Union Election Commission also put forward their discussions. A mutual discussion and coordination took place on the points raised, and the Union minister provided supplementary instructions as necessary. — MNA/KZL

Mandalay Earthquake: Damage, Losses, and Response Report

THE powerful Mandalay earthquake that struck on 28 March caused casualties, missing persons, injuries and damage to basic infrastructure in 10 regions and states, including the Nay Pyi Taw Union Territory.

According to the ground survey, the loss in the government sector, like dams, roads, bridges, education, health, train transport, electricity, energy, communication, religious affairs, culture, government-owned factories and workshops and office buildings is over K4,779 billion. Meanwhile, the private sector, like housing, private factories, workshops, businesses, private schools, hospitals, clinics and agricultural products, face the loss of over K3,200 billion, totalling more than K7,979 billion (US\$3,800 million)

Among regions and states, Mandalay Region suffered the most damage and losses, followed by Nay Pyi Taw Union Territory in second place, and Sagaing Region in third. By sector, damage to government offices, buildings, office equipment, and staff housing was the highest, whereas the damage to residential buildings was the second highest, and the religious buildings was the third highest.

The government has provided support for the losses and damage caused by the earthquake. From the occurrence date of the earthquake up to 11 August 2025, more than K42.094 billion from the National Disaster Management Fund has been provided for emergency food assistance as directly benefit to the affected people, over K4.733 billion for assistance to the families of the deceased, K0.175 billion for the injured, and more than K1,605.571 billion for the reconstruction of houses, totalling over K1,652.573 billion. More than K340 billion has been spent on early rehabilitation activities. The foodstuffs and commodities donated by local and foreign donors are also distributed to the quake-affected areas promptly.

The earthquake destroyed the government offices, basic education schools, and staff housing. To ensure accommodation for staff and the reopening of offices and schools, 442 container offices, 9,048 container houses, and 20 temporary prefabricated school buildings have been distributed to ministries,

organizations, and affected areas. In addition, in Nay Pyi Taw Union Territory, 2,972 temporary housing units have been constructed, while 127 units are still under construction, and 57 temporary school buildings have been built, whereas seven buildings are still under construction.

Under the guidance of the Head of State, rehabilitation activities are being carried out with proper momentum in each sector. All basic education schools are reopened on time, and in the healthcare sector, hospitals and clinics have also been reopened. The maintenance work was completed 94.43 per cent in the road, 38.83 per cent in the bridge and 96.39 per cent in the railways sectors. In the telecommunications sector, 97.19 per cent of services have been restored, while in electricity distribution, the coverage has reached 98.61 per cent. To ensure the successful completion of the rehabilitation measures, efforts are being carried out with momentum by sector and organization.

Earthquake toll hits 3,773 dead, **5,104** injured, 35 missing as of 13 Aug

AS of 13 August, in the six regions and states of Myanmar most severely affected by the powerful earthquake that struck on 28 March, there have been 3,773 deaths, 5,104 injuries, and 35 people reported missing.

The Myanmar Fire Services Department is continuing clearance and reconstruction efforts, as well as conducting search-and-rescue operations for people trapped inside buildings. Up to the present date, 653 survivors have been rescued, and 851 deceased persons have been recovered.

Further updates will be issued regarding monetary and in-kind donations provided by both domestic and international donors for the victims. MNA/MKKS

2025 university entrance exam mark certificates resume on 13 Aug via token system

THE Department of Myanmar Examinations has announced that the issuance of the 2025 University Entrance Examination mark certificates will resume in regions and states on 13 August, using a token system, according to the Department of Myanmar Examinations.

Although the distribution of the mark certificates began on 30 July, the process was temporarily suspended on 4 August due to errors found in the mark certificates. The issuance will now recommence from 13 August.

"On 13 August, mark certificates will be issued for Kachin, Kayah, Kayin, Chin, Rakhine, Mon, and Shan States. On 14 August, the mark certificates for Sagaing, Taninthayi, Magway,

and Bago regions will be issued. The dates for the remaining regions will be announced later," said an official from the department.

For the issuance process, four counters will be open at the department's headquarters in Nay Pyi Taw, and ten counters at its Yangon branch, with counters designated for each state and region.

To obtain a token, applicants must bring their Citizenship Scrutiny Card, driving licence, student card, or other form of identification. In the application for the mark certificates, they must fill in their roll number, name, pass/fail status, and any subjects passed with distinction. Incomplete applications will not be accepted. — ASH/KNN

Myanmar earns US\$96M from over 80,000 MT of fishery exports in Apr–Jul

Myanmar is steadily exporting seafood to 40 countries, including China, Thailand, Bangladesh and Japan, through maritime routes and land borders.

MYANMAR exported more than 81,000 tonnes of fish in the past four months of the current financial year 2025-2026, beginning 1 April, earning US\$96 million, according to the Department of Fisheries.

Myanmar delivered over 45,900 tonnes of fish by sea, with an estimated value of \$67 million. Over 35,000 tonnes of fish worth \$29 million were exported to neighbouring countries via the border channel.

Myanmar's fish export amounted to \$421 million from

about 400,000 tonnes in the previous FY 2024-2025 (April-March).

Myanmar steadily ships seafood to 40 countries, including China, Thailand, Bangladesh and Japan, through maritime and border trade channels.

Seafood, including hilsa, rohu, catfish, seabass, eel, shrimp and crab, is exported to foreign markets, according to the Myanmar Fisheries Federation. There are over 140 fishery cold storage facilities, and the department grants annual licence renewals. — NN/KK

Myanmar, Russia in talks to set up trading house

THE director-general of the Myanmar Trade Promotion Organization (MyanTrade) received Mr Konstantin Kanarev, Trade Representative of the Russian Federation to Myanmar, at the Myanmar International Trade Centre of MyanTrade on 11 August 2025 and discussed establishing a trading house to facilitate bilateral trade between Myanmar and Russia.

The meeting highlighted export potential for agricultural produce from Myanmar to Russia, possible import items from Russia, agricultural produce, market conditions, trade procedures, and establishing a trading house to accelerate trade cooperation between the two countries.

MyanTrade, under the Ministry of Commerce, held a virtual meeting on 28 July regarding the export of Myanmar mango pulp to Russia. Russia primarily imports mango pulp from India. They want to import 10,000 tonnes of mango pulp

from India. MyanTrade will link Russian buyers with Myanmar dried mango and mango pulp suppliers.

Business entities also discussed challenges and collaboration matters with Russian buyers to boost dried mango and mango pulp exports.

Afterwards, MyanTrade held a hybrid meeting on 28 July for the exportation of Myanmar's high-grade coffee to Russia.

The meeting focused on coffee cultivation to export high-grade coffee, production situation, coffee market outlook in Russia and potential coffee varieties, in the presence of MyanTrade officials, Myanmar's economic counsellor in Russia, and representatives of the Myanmar Coffee Association and coffee suppliers.

MyanTrade, the Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation and the economic counsellor in Russia will coordinate the needs for coffee export to Russia. — NN/KK

CBM to inject US\$32M into fuel sector

THE Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) announced on 13 August that it would sell US\$32 million to those engaged in the fuel oil sector.

CBM injected \$1.3 million into edible oil importing companies and over \$467,000 into CMP companies and those who made non-trade payments after sales of over 1.97 million yuan on 12 August. Importers of refined sugar, plastic, fertilizers, pharmaceutical and medical equipment, electrical devices, industrial raw materials, construction materials, auto parts, telecommunication devices, trailers, feedstuffs, paint, tar and food commodities also purchased foreign currencies through the foreign exchange market online trading platform.

The Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) sold \$1.18 million to edible oil-importing companies and over \$415,900 to fuel oil-importing companies on 11 August after purchasing the foreign currencies from companies working on a Cut, Make and Pack basis.

Furthermore, CBM injected over 65,000 yuan into the market on that day. CBM also sold over \$348,000 to CMP companies and those who made non-trade payment transactions. Additionally, importers of refined sugar, pharmaceuticals, pharma raw materials, electrical devices, industrial raw materials, construction materials, auto parts, motorcycle parts, telecommunication equipment, pesticides, tar and food commodities bought foreign currencies via online trading platforms.

CBM injected over 1.46 million yuan and over 930,300 baht on 8 August.

Additionally, CBM sold \$701,120 to edible oil-importing companies and \$361,921 to fuel oil-importing companies on the same day.

CBM sold over \$1.665 million to edible oil-importing companies after an injection of over 56,000

yuan into the market on 7 August.

CBM sold \$36.5 million purchased from companies working on a Cut, Make and Pack basis, in addition to the injection of \$8.8 million, 13.3 million baht, 10.5 million yuan and 500,000 rupees in July. Furthermore, CBM sold over \$2.3 million to other commodities-importing companies as per its initial announcement of selling \$10 million. CBM sold \$8.4 million, 13.9 million baht and 5.2 million yuan in June 2025, in addition to the injection of \$14.9 million that was purchased from the CMP enterprises into the

financial market.

CBM aims to curb the instability in the foreign exchange market and currency devaluation. According to CBM's notification on 15 March 2024, it has been collaborating with law enforcement agencies to combat and prosecute those who attempt to manipulate the currency market under the existing laws. CBM allowed authorized dealers (private banks) to operate online foreign exchange trading freely as per the market rate, depending on supply and demand, starting from 5 December 2023. — NN/

New cancer plan urged as survival improvements in England slow

MPROVEMENTS in cancer survival rates in England and Wales have slowed down significantly since 2010, according to a major study released Wednesday, leading to calls for an urgent national cancer plan.

The study, conducted by the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine, measured the survival index for 10.8 million adults diagnosed with cancer between 1971 and 2018, accounting for variables like age, sex, and cancer type.

It found substantial improvements over the 48-year period with the five-year survival index increasing from 28.8 per cent in 1971-72 to 56.6 per cent in 2018.

However, the pace of progress has slowed in recent years. The 10-year survival index improved by four percent between 2000-01 and 2005-06 and only 1.4 per cent between

The slowdown since 2010 "is likely to be at least partly explained by longer waits for diagnosis and treatment," said

The deceleration has been observed across many individual cancers, "implying a system-wide challenge," said the study, funded by the Cancer Research UK charity.



OWIC approved for 70+ skilled workers' overseas employment

SAFE Migration said 73 skilled workers who are going to Japan, Singapore, Laos, Cambodia, the UAE, Qatar, Oman, Papua New Guinea, France and India on their own will be allowed for training and Overseas Worker Identification Card (OWIC) application.

They will have to attend the training on 14 August, and the OWIC application is being scheduled on 15 August, and they need to inform if they are unable to do so according to the schedule.

Furthermore, OWIC was also allowed for 76 workers on leave and going back to Thailand, Japan, Singapore, Malaysia, the USA and Macao. They will have to do OWIC on 15 August and will need to inform if they are unable to do so according to the schedule. — MT/ZS

MNHRC inspects Belin (1), Belin (2) Labour Camps in Sintgaing, Shwe Say Ti Home for the Aged, and Kyaukse Police Lock-up

AN inspection team led by the Commissioner of the Myanmar National Human Rights Commission, U Kyaw Myint, inspected Belin (1), Belin (2) Labour Camps under the Department of Prisons in Sintgaing Township, as well as the Shwe Say Ti Home for the Aged and the Kyaukse Police Lock-up in Kyaukse Township yesterday under Sections 43 and 44 of the Commission Law.

During the inspection, responsible officials of each labour camp presented administrative and logistical matters. Prisoners were gathered and met in the dining hall and the community hall. The inspection team assessed whether the prisoners had access to their fundamental rights, including an adequate food supply, access to healthcare, and provision of sufficient purified water. The team also enquired about the receipt of items issued by the prison and items sent by their family, as well as whether the prisoners were allowed family visits. Additionally, the team evaluated the conditions for physical activities, the right to freedom of religion, workplace safety measures and whether or not prisoners were required to work overtime, any instances of discrimination in the workplace and investigated any instances of human rights violations or torture in the workplace.

Then the inspection team looked over the dormitories, the prison clinic, library, kitchen, dining hall, food warehouse, water purifiers, water sanitation system and the cleanliness of both internal and external sewage. Additionally, the MNHRC donated knowledgeable books for the benefit of the prisoners.

At the Shwe Say Ti Home for the Aged, the inspection team met elderly residents in their living quarters and assessed arrange of conditions, including the provision of healthcare services, food and nutritional support, access to clean drinking and household water, freedom of religion and belief, and the overall hygiene and sanitation standards of

dormitories, bathrooms, toilets, and kitchens. The team also inquired about arrangements for recreation and relaxation, the accessibility of pension payments for eligible residents, and the availability of social pension support for those aged 85 and above.

At the Kyaukse police Lock-up, the MNHRC team inspected the conditions of detainees during the remand period, whether any torture occurred during the investigation, and whether there were opportunities to meet with family members, as well as the arrangements for food provision during the court appearance period, the disposal of sewage, and the overall cleanliness of the facilities and whether the conditions of access to meet family members and legal assistance during the court appearance period.

MNHRC will send recommendations to the relevant departments for necessary actions based on the findings during the inspection. — MNHRC


Renowned Egyptian novelist Sonallah Ibrahim dies at 88

EGYPTIAN novelist Sonallah Ibrahim, famed for his critiques of political repression, neoliberalism and Western hegemony, has died at the age of 88, the culture ministry announced on Wednesday.

Ibrahim "passed away today, leaving behind an immortal literary and humanitarian legacy," Culture Minister Ahmed Fouad Hanno said in a tribute, calling the writer a "pillar of modern Arabic literature".

Cambodia's trade with ASEAN rises to US\$9.67B during Jan-Jul period

CAMBODIA'S trade volume with its fellow ASEAN member states reached US\$9.67 billion in the first seven months of 2025, up 5.2 per cent from 9.19 billion dollars over the same period last year, said an official report on Wednesday.

The country exported products worth \$3.53 billion to other ASEAN countries during the January-July period this year, up 17.8 percent year-on-year, while its total import amounted to \$6.14 billion, up 0.92 per cent, said the report compiled by the Ministry of Commerce.

Cambodia's trade volume with ASEAN accounted for 26.2 per cent of the kingdom's total

trade volume of \$36.88 billion in the first seven months of 2025, the report said.

The kingdom's top five trading partners in ASEAN were Vietnam, Thailand, Singapore, Indonesia, and Malaysia, the report added.

Cambodian Ministry of Commerce's Secretary of State and Spokesperson Penn Sovicheat said the main products the country exported to ASE-AN included garments, shoes, travel goods, bags, solar panels, car tires, electronics, and agricultural products such as rice, cashew nuts, rubber latex, cassava, durians and bananas. — Xinhua

China's marine economy makes steady progress in H1: official

The service sector was the largest contributor to the marine economy in 2024, accounting for 59.6 per cent of the total GOP.

CHINA'S marine economy made steady progress in the first half of 2025, said Gu Wu, an official with the Ministry of Natural Resources, on Wednesday.

Gu made the remarks when speaking on the latest episode of the China Economic Roundtable, an all-media talk show hosted by Xinhua News Agency.

According to preliminary

calculations, China's gross ocean product (GOP) grew 5.8 per cent year on year to 5.1 trillion yuan (about US\$714.1 billion) in the first half of this year, data from the Ministry of Natural Resources showed.

China's marine economy achieved a significant milestone in 2024, with its GOP exceeding 10 trillion yuan for the first time, according to data from the ministry. China's GOP had reached 10.54 trillion yuan in 2024, marking an increase of 5.9 per cent from the previous year.

Notably, the service sector was the largest contributor to the marine economy in 2024, contributing 59.6 per cent of the total GOP. Marine manufacturing emerged as a key driver, accounting for over 30 per cent of the total GOP.

VIETNAMESE Prime Minister Pham Minh Chinh has ordered the Ministry of Industry and Trade to continue tariff negotiations with the United States to secure the most favorable commitments for Vietnam, aiming for a comprehensive, balanced and sustainable trade agreement, Vietnam News Agency reported Wednesday.


The government leader assigned ministries, localities and stateowned enterprises to take measures in response to Washington's tariff policy.

Since 1 August the United States has lowered tariffs on Vietnamese goods from 46 per cent to 20 per cent under an executive order signed by US President Donald Trump that modified tariff rates for 69 trading partners. — Xinhua

Japan's key stock indexes end at new record highs

JAPAN'S key stock indexes ended at fresh all-time highs on Wednesday, sending the benchmark Nikkei index above the 43,000 line, as US inflation data eased concerns over rising prices in the world's largest economy. The 225-issue Nikkei Stock Average gained 556.50 points, or 1.30 per cent, from Tuesday at 43,274.67. The broader Topix index finished 25.54 points, or 0.83 per cent, higher at 3,091.91.

Fortnite developer claims win against Apple and Google

AN Australian court has found Apple and Google misused their market power in a dispute with the maker of wildly popular video game Fortnite.

Both Apple and Google kicked Fortnite off their respective app platforms in 2020, after the game designed an in-app payments system that cut the tech giants out of the loop.

Developer Epic Games retaliated by launching legal action against the tech giants in a string of courtrooms around the world.

Australia's Federal Court this week found the tech firms' app-store dominance reduced competition, likely forcing game developers to pay higher commission fees.

"This is a WIN for developers and consumers in Australia!" Epic Games said in a statement Tuesday.

Justice Jonathan Beach however rejected Epic Games' claims that Apple and Google engaged in unconscionable conduct.

A Google spokesperson said the company disagreed with some of the court's findings and would "review the full decision when we receive it and assess our next steps". Australian lawyers have lodged a class action suit seeking compensation from Apple and Google on behalf of game users and developers. — AFP

China launches anti-dumping probe into pea starch imports from Canada

CHINA on Tuesday initiated an anti-dumping probe into imported pea starch from Canada, the Ministry of Commerce has said.

The probe was launched in response to an application from domestic enterprises in relevant industries, the ministry said.

It noted that preliminary evidence has shown that dumped Canadian pea starch imports have surged in recent years at prices consistently below domestic levels, causing operational difficulties and losses for the domestic industry, the ministry said. — Xinhua

A Chinese envoy said Tuesday that the security of the Red Sea shipping lanes must be maintained.

Last month, the Houthis claimed responsibility for sinking two commercial vessels -- Magic Seas and Eternity C -- in the Red Sea.

China finds it deeply concerning and calls on the Houthis to respect the navigational rights of commercial vessels of all countries in the Red Sea in accordance with international law, and to stop harassing or attacking them, said Geng Shuang, China's deputy permanent representative to the United Nations.

"The shipping lanes in the Red Sea should be kept safe, and the safety and security of civilians, including seafarers, should be protected. Yemen's sovereignty, security and territorial integrity should also be respected," he told a UN Security Council meeting on the situation in Yemen. — Xinhua

French President Emmanuel Macron signs law banning beekilling pesticide after mass petition

FRENCH President Emmanuel Macron has signed into law a modified bill banning the reintroduction of a bee-killing pesticide, following a petition signed by more than two million people, France 24 reported. The legislation, which has sparked a major debate in France, was adopted in July

in a divided lower house of parliament and has faced criticism for being rushed through without proper discussion, according to France 24.

The law was published in the government's official journal on Tuesday after the Constitutional Council, France's highest court, struck down a

contested provision regarding the reintroduction of acetamiprid.

The court ruled that neonicotinoid insecticides posed "risks to human health" and deemed the provision unconstitutional for undermining the right to live in a balanced and healthy environment as guaranteed by the country's environmental charter, France 24 stated.

Acetamiprid, banned in France since 2018, remains legal in the European Union. Supporters of the pesticide argue that French farmers need it to stay competitive with European counterparts.

The main farmers' union has opposed the court ruling while welcoming the approval of other parts of the legislation, including measures to simplify planning permission for livestock buildings and water reservoirs for irrigation, France 24 reported. — ANI

Myanmar tops Group B, advances to ASEAN Women's Championship semifinals

yanmar secured first place in Group B of the 2025 ASEAN Women's Championship and advanced to the semifinals after drawing 1-1 with defending champions the Philippines on 13 August in Vietnam.

In the day's other Group B match, Australia defeated Timor-Leste 9-0. The result meant Myanmar topped the group, while the Philippines was eliminated from the tournament, losing its grip on the title. Having won their first two matches, Myanmar went into the final group game knowing the result would be decisive for their semifinal hopes.

The Philippines, needing a win, started aggressively, but Myanmar's defence held firm. After the opening 10 minutes, Myanmar began to counter effectively, and in 32 minutes, Win Theingi Tun was fouled in the

box, earning a penalty. She converted the spot kick herself to give Myanmar the lead.

The Philippines equalized in the $71^{\rm st}$ minute through Nina, capitalizing on a defensive lapse. Myanmar held on to preserve the draw, although substitute Yoo Wadi Hlaing missed a late chance to secure the win with a $90^{\rm th}$ -minute free kick.

At the end of the group stage, Vietnam topped Group A with nine points, followed by Thailand with six. In Group B, Myanmar finished first with seven points, while Australia took second with six.

The semifinals, set for 16 August, will see Myanmar face
Thailand, while host Vietnam will take on Australia.

Swiss pilot surpasses solar-powered plane altitude record

SWISS pilot Raphael Domjan beat the altitude record for a solar-powered electric plane in a flight that took

him soaring to 9,521 metres, his team announced Wednesday.

landmark flight from Sion airport in southwest Switzerland on Tuesday, taking advantage of warm air thermals to go beyond the 15-year-old record.

The certified altitude record for a solar plane had stood at 9,235 metres (30,298 feet). It was set in 2010 by the Solar Impulse plane, with Swiss pilot Andre Borschberg at the controls.

Domjan's flight lasted five hours and nine minutes.

"I share this moment of joy with all the people who have been preparing for this achievement for years," he said, celebrating afterwards with the melted cheese of a traditional Swiss raclette.

The data will be sent to the World Air Sports Federation governing body, which will decide whether to validate the new record. — AFP

NARCOTICS CONTROL LAW

Record 1 tonne of cannabis, worth \$35M, seized in Japan

JAPANESE narcotics agents said Wednesday they have seized 1.046 tonnes of cannabis worth about 5.2 billion yen (\$35 million) on the street, marking Japan's largest-ever single-raid illegal drug haul. The Ministry of Health, Labour and Welfare's Narcotics Control Department has arrested three Vietnamese nationals for allegedly smuggling the cannabis hidden in a shipping container and possessing it at a material yard in Tochigi Prefecture, north of Tokyo, it said.

The three have been indicted on charges of violating the narcotics control law. – Kyodo
